

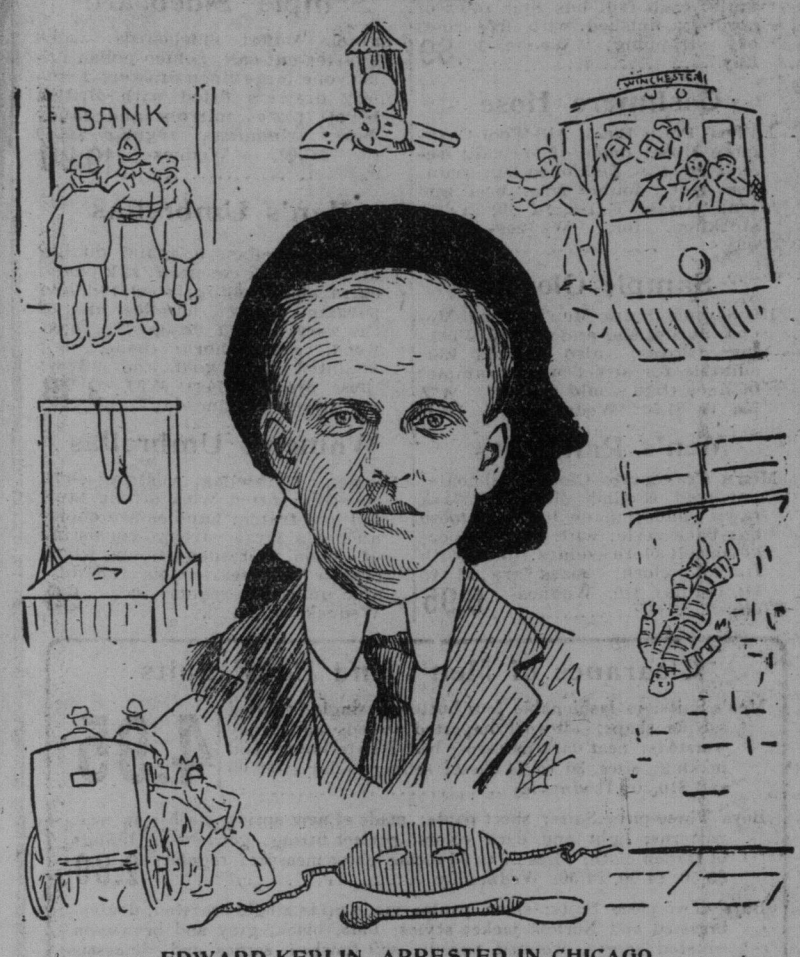

Kerlin May Never Come Here

Police Are Certain He Caused Murder of Boyd, but United States Authorities Demand a Positive Conviction.

Herewith is the picture of the mysterious crook who threw the revolver to the Rutledge gang when they killed Constable Boyd three years ago. Grave doubts are expressed by Inspector Stark as to the chances of Kerlin being extradited. He received a letter from United States Postoffice Inspector Stewart yesterday concerning the prisoner.

The suspect is in jail at Chicago. The federal authorities have several charges of robbery against him. Inspector Stewart wrote the Toronto department that he would surrender him provided the Canadian authorities could assure the United States officials that they could not implicate him in the murder case. However, since he is charged with direct and the chance good for sending the prisoner to the United States for a long term there.

May Never Come Back.
Inspector Stark wrote that while he had some half dozen witnesses who could identify the photo of Edward Kerlin as the man they saw running from the scene of the tragedy immediately after the pistols were tossed into the cab. It was uncertain how they would impress a jury, and he could not undertake to give any assurance that the courts could secure a conviction positively. It is just possible that Kerlin may never be brought to Canada.

Nothing better illustrates the intelligence with which the detective department of Toronto is directed or the inside workings of the forces that are supposed to protect society from crooks than the story of the capture of Kerlin at that time. This fact contributed in no small degree to the difficulty of convicting him with the present system of Bertillon identification, any person who has been convicted of a felony or has been in the hands of the police under circumstances indicating that they may develop into a professional crook, is registered, photographed and measured so accurately that disguise can never be used.

IS IT CONTEMPT OF COURT?
McBRADY MAKES BOLD MOVE

Proceeds Against Eight Members of the Board of Education—Sees Jail for Them.

Those who voted to suspend Miss Dunn at last Thursday's session of the board of education will have to answer a charge of contempt of court on Thursday next. L. V. McBrady is responsible for this latest development in the case, and he says that the supporters of the motion to suspend Miss Dunn disobeyed the spirit, if not the letter, of the injunction restraining them from dissuading her.

The argument is that any move that had as its object the ultimate ousting of the young lady was a direct breach of the injunction which he got out before Justice MacMahon on Thursday last. Papers were served yesterday afternoon on the eight supporters of the motion to suspend.

The trustees involved are: Leves, Rawlinson, Ogden, Brown, Simpson, Keeler, Shaw, and Parkinson. The papers are returnable on Thursday next, and on that day Mr. McBrady will move for the imprisonment of the eight mentioned.

If Miss Dunn's lawyers press the case the trustees promise to fight her to the bitter end. They say that they will be unique in the history of educational affairs in Toronto. They say that they will fight the case to the privy council, if necessary.

ORGY OF BURSTING SHELLS
JAPS' AWFUL EXECUTION

Russian Officer Vividly Describes Bombardment of Port Arthur, "Blood Everywhere."

St. Petersburg, March 21.—A Russian officer commanding a battery on Electric Hill, during a bombardment of Port Arthur, has written the following vivid account:

"It was a clear sunlight day, and there was a gentle swell on the water. A little spot appeared thru the haze on the far horizon and then another and another until those spots were increased to 15. Nearer and nearer they came, and larger and larger they appeared, until, when six miles off, there was a tiny puff of smoke and all in the battery wondered where the projectile was going to fall.

"Forty fathoms below the cliff where stood the battleship Peresvict, the shells burst, and the water was splashing the decks with spray. There was another puff and a projectile whistled overhead, crashing on the rock behind us. Then came a third. It was a moment of terrible suspense. There was a terrific explosion, and a head. They had got our range exactly."

"It was the signal for us to open fire, and ten shore batteries and 12 warships joined in the reply.

"Sea fairly boiled. The sea underneath where we stood fairly boiled with the splash and plunge of words and words of the guns. It was impossible to shout my orders. I tried vainly to shout my orders, while 100 guns were belching in the distance, the smoke stinking the air.

"What One Shell Can Do.
"One shell burst in the water near the gunners. A soldier was lying down, and another had his skull crushed. A third soldier was hurled into the air and landed on his back. One gun had been broken like a reed.

"In concluding his narrative the officer says: "After the battle was over, Lieut. Gen. Stoessel, commander at Port Arthur, planned the cross of St. George on my breast. But what does it matter? I am in the hospital."

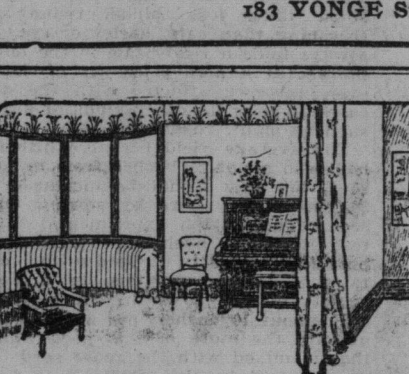
TO BUILD THE CANAL.

The Two Grays Stand Trial

It Took Half an Hour to Choose a Jury in the Case of Alleged Ballot Stuffers—Judge Overrides the Application of Lawyer Denton.

Before Judge Winchester in the sessions the first trial of those supposed to be implicated in the alleged frauds at the last municipal election was commenced.

Frank Gray, D.R.O. sub-division 1, Ward 6, and his poll clerk, Col. John Gray, were arraigned on the charge that they did unlawfully combine, conspire, confederate and intrigue to take, open and otherwise interfere with the ballot box and ballots.

Mr. Drayton is conducting the case for the crown, Frank Denton, L.C.J., represents Frank Gray, and H. L. Dunn, C.J., Denton's Request.

After the charge was read to the defendants and before they pleaded guilty, the judge asked them to quash the indictment, on the ground that it was his client's duty as a D.R.O. to examine the ballots.

colonies, and the opposition was now making the benefits of the evils which their own party had produced. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's motion was rejected, 209 to 242. Urgent whips of all parties had secured a big attendance, and many of the Irish members had hurried from Dublin. In the division, thirteen Unionist members, including Winston Churchill, abstained from voting. Sixty-five Nationalist members voted against the government, the majority for which was rather larger than any in the several recent critical divisions. The vote was received with cheers.

Chinese labor in the Transvaal was also debated during the entire session of the house of lords this evening, on a motion of Lord Coleridge (Liberal) that "this house disapproves of the importation of Chinese laborers in the Transvaal, under the recent ordinance, until that country has been granted a full representative government."

The Bishop of Hereford (John Percival, D.D., Liberal) severely criticized High Commissioner Milner, who, he was utterly unqualified to hold a high office on account of his temper. The mine owners, the bishop added, wanted the ordinance, but the owners did not represent the people, who were opposed to it.

Lord Goschen (Liberal-Unionist) warmly defended Lord Milner. Lord Coleridge's motion was rejected by a vote of 97 to 25.

ANOTHER REPORT.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, March 22.—The intricacies of the Chinese labor question reduced the government majority in the house of commons from 166 to 57 after some of the wildest scenes of the session. Right Hon. H. Campbell-Bannerman (Liberal leader) in introducing the vote of censure, asked the house to disapprove of the conduct of the ministry in advancing the crown not to disallow the ordinance. He characterized it as a system of slavery and declared the exclusion of white labor was an outrage on the white man. When the war was in progress the government appealed to British workmen on the ground that the war was a miners' war. He appealed to the house to maintain in unimpaired vitality those principles which were as a great colonizing race and as a freedom-loving people, believed were essential to public life and public policy. In reply to a question, "Will you reverse it?" Campbell-Bannerman rejoined, "Put me in power." John Burns here cut in between his leader and the house, but his remarks were rendered inaudible by a whirlwind of cries of "Order."

Right Hon. Alfred Lyttelton (colonial secretary), speaking hotly, repudiated the charge of slavery, which he declared was made for party purposes. He quoted Prof. James Bryce's book on South Africa that it cannot be a white man's land. His chief argument was based on the favorable report of the royal commission appointed by the Canadian government to investigate the charges made against the Chinese in British Columbia and the statement of the Bishop of British Columbia that Chinese labor quiet, sober, moral, lives, Chinese laborers in Africa would receive ten or fifteen times higher wages than they would at home.

Sir Gilbert Parker pleaded that the white interests of South Africa, which were attacked by Lord Milner, declared that his temper obscured his judgment, and said that a man with such a reputation, M.P., tendered his resignation, along with a statement that the voice of the colonies since day would have been listened to instead of being laughed at. His remarks were received with shouts of laughter and cries that he had been reading the life of Disraeli. The clamor continued after the rise of Premier Balfour, whose opening remarks were howled down amid cries of "Divide," and angry interruptions from the Irish benches. Major Seely finally succeeded in securing a hearing thru the premier, who declared that the system of indentured labor in British Guiana was practically identical with the system proposed for the Transvaal. Australia was a white man's land, but in South Africa there were eight blacks to one white man. The blacks were increasing fastest, and should the Transvaal be allowed to go thru a grave commercial crisis rather than admit Chinese labor precisely the same regulations would be used in South Africa as in British Columbia.

Right Hon. Henry Asquith (Liberal) said he did not think it ought to turn a deaf ear to the feelings and remonstrances of the self-governing colonies under ordinary circumstances, but the Australia had no business to interfere with Canada or Canada with Australia, but the case they were now dealing with was absolutely unique in our history. These colonies came to our aid in the moment of stress and necessity, they split their best blood on the soil of South Africa in the name of freedom and for the cause of civilization. They had close and direct experience of the Chinese labor question, and we would do wisely if where a legal opinion was not authentically ascertained, we disregarded the practically unanimous sentiment of every self-governing community. (Ministerial cries of dissent and Mr. Lyttelton interjected "Canada.") Mr. Asquith said: "I would like to see a plebiscite taken in Canada. It is quite true that the Canadian government had not associated themselves with the Australian government's protest, but the overwhelming opinion of the people of Canada is in the same sense. Chinese labor is not demanded by the circumstances of the Transvaal, and the economic position, the serious, would recover itself if the healing forces were allowed to operate."

Insurance in England Pile.
London, March 22.—The insurance in Sunday's fire were: On buildings, \$800,000; in Royal, and \$400 in Commercial Union and \$150 in Royal. I. A. A., \$500 in Royal; R. N. Thurtell, \$250; British America, and Queen's, I. Andrews, \$400 in Manchester.
