

ARRIVAL OF THE DISPATCHES. Washington, May 7 .- Notwithstanding that everybody for several days past has been in momentary expectation of cable advices from Commodore Dewey, the town was thrown into the wildest excitement at breakfast time this morning by the issue of extra papers announcing the arrival of the Mc-Culloch at Hong Kong with dispatches of the engagement from Commodore Dewey. The publication of newspaper dispatches telling of the terrible mortality among the Spanish and the escape of the American forces, men and ships from serious injury, added to the excitement and to the intense satisfaction with which the long expected news was received.

RUSH FOR NEWS. There was an instant rush of newspaper men to the navy department to secure further information from official sources, and perhaps dismayed by the number and impetuousity of the newspaper contingent, the officials of the navigation bureau, where cipher dispatches are transcribed and translated. promptly closed and locked their door against invasion. One of the officers of the bureau has been on duty every moment of the 24 hours for several weeks past, waiting to receive cables of importance. 
