Ottawa, March 14.-With reference to a Canadian Associated Press cable Yelisavetgrad, Russia, March 14.-An from London today quoting a Mel-New Zealand, in which he said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in private letters to him. not in favor of such a Council. The views of the Government on that ques-

Sir Wilfrid will unite with the other colonial premiers in endeavoring to reach a definite understanding with the Imperial Government as to the position of the colonies in regard to British treaty obligations. The Dominion Government is anxious that Great Britain in making treaties with foreign Boston powers will not grant any trade concessions which would interfere with Canada's freedom to make her own New York trade treaties with other countries.
