Twenty Burned to Death In a 'Frisco Hotel Fire

Scores of Sleeping Italian Laborers Trapped by Flames and Buried Beneath Falling Walls.

San Francisco, April 4.-Twenty men were burned to death and twenty others injured in a fire which destroyed an Italian hotel af Seventeenth and Connecticut streets, in the Potrero district, early today. The injured were of the laboring class, and were asleep in their rooms when the fire started. Before they could be aroused, the flames had spread through the building. The walls fell, and the inmates were buried in the ruins, twenty being taken out dead and dying. People from other hotels in the vicinity rushed to the assistance of the buried victims and succeeded in rescuing all of them from the flaming timbers. Teams were hurriedly harnessed and automobiles brought into service, and the injured were rushed to the Potrero Emergency Hospital, where several dled while awaiting treatment.

The majority of the injured were hurt in leaping from the upper windows. A number of women are reported to have been in the building, and all of them are believed to have perished.

Hon. Mr. Fielding to Lead the liouse, Which Prorogues About End of Month.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 4. - A Government caucus was held this morning before the meeting of the House. It was purely a family gathering to say goodbye to the Premier and his two colleagues, who leave this afternoon for the colonial conference in London, will devolve upon Hon. Mr. Fielding, and Senior Privy Councilor Cartwright will be acting premier. This is the standing rule.

Sir Wilfrid announced that no contentious legislation would be pressed, and that the session would likely be brought to a close about the 20th of the month. On the 22nd Parliament will have been in session five months. Among the bills to be held over will be the Dominion lands act.
