Asked by Mr. Arnoldi as to the probable dose which killed Perkins, Dr. Johnston said it was a matter of conjecture. Here the testimony of Dr. Johnston was closed.

then called. Mr. Arnold said that he did not intend to go into the details of his expert evidence, and contented agreed with the medical testimony so far heard. "I do," said the doctor. "I got the poison from three sources," said the detective. "I got a portion of it from Dr. Snyder. Another portion I bought at the local drug store, with the object of comparing it. The rest I found in the small wooden pink pill box in a cabinet in the kitchen of the Perkins home. When I got the latter Crown Attorney Murphy, Chief Farrell, John Perkins, and Constable Everingham were with me. That part of it was not in my hands three minutes, as I handed it over to Murphy. The portion I got from Dr. Snyder was sealed by him before I got possession of it, and the seal was not broken until Prof. Ellis opened the package. The quantity I bought I conveyed personally to Prof. Elis. That is the story of the poison.'

At the afternon session the application of Mr. Johnston for the production of certain original documents now in possession of the crown was again brought up. Mr. Arnoldi contended that these documents were a matter between the crown and the witness Mr. Johnston stated that he had relied on their being produced, the crown attorney having previously offered no objections. 
