Canada's performances at the Olympic were not many of them brilliant, bu B. Bennison, one of England's best known sport writers, tells an interesting story of Earl Thomson's wonderful achievement in the 110 metres hurdles:

"Thomson, whose Christian name is Earl, a young man, full 6 feet high, made history this afternoon in the Stadium by creating a new re-cord in the final of the 110 metres hurdle race. This event he won in high, made history this afternoon in the Stadium by creating a new record in the final of the 110 metres hurdle race. This event he won in 14 4-5 seconds. Officially nothing so good has ever been accomplished before, though Thomson came to Antwerp credited with having done 14 2-5 seconds at home over practically the same distance. The world's previous best was 15 seconds, by F. C. Smithson, running for America in the Olympic games in 1908. Thomson, who is a Canadian, is the most wonderful hurdler ever seen. It is not possible to find in all athletic history a man who possessed such phenomenal speed or one who took fences flying as he does. He is a freak. Even to run at lightning speed as he did this afternoon, seemed ridiculously easy; he kind of played ninepins with the five men who were his competitors; and these five, representing America, New Zealand, and Sweden, were great and distinguished hurdlers. Like Thomson in the heats, Harold Barrow, America, had equalled record: Walter Smith and Fred Murray, his fellow-countryman Wilson. New Zealand, and Christienssen, Sweden, may be regarded as tremendous fellows, but from the crack of the pistol to the breaking of the tape they were almost as selling platers to a Derby winner compared with Thomson. We had looked for a titanic struggle; the preliminaries had prepared us for such, but it could not have been that those who looked on expected a race so electrifying. To the average spectator it must have been all incredible; the rapidity of it left the layman open-mouthed and wholly astonished. The pistol went; the start was perfect, and six tense men, tugging and straining as will a greyhound at a leash, so it seemed, sprung forward. In one gigantic stride Thomson was in front, and as if in the same second he was over the first fence, merely skimming it, swallow fashion. There might have been no obstacles for all the hurdles meant to Thomson; and before one had time to appreciate the fact he was past the winning post, two and a half yards in front of Baron, with Mur
