Riverdale Real Estate.
An award in an arbitration of considerable interest to the property owners east of the Don has been handed out by the arbitrators, P. H. Drayton, K.C., H. H. Williams and Walter Gillespie.

The arbitration was to fix the ground rent on the block on the northeast corner of Queen-street and Verrill-avenue, the freehold in which is owned by John Russell and the leasehold by the Baldwin estate. In the block, which has a frontage of 150 feet on Queen-street by a like frontage on Verrill-avenue, there are 11 stores and 12 dwellings.

The arbitrators by the award fixed the ground rent for the next 21 years at \$20 per annum. This, upon a four per cent. basis, places the value of the land at \$50 per foot.

OSLER SECURE IN WEST HIS MAJORITY BIGGEST

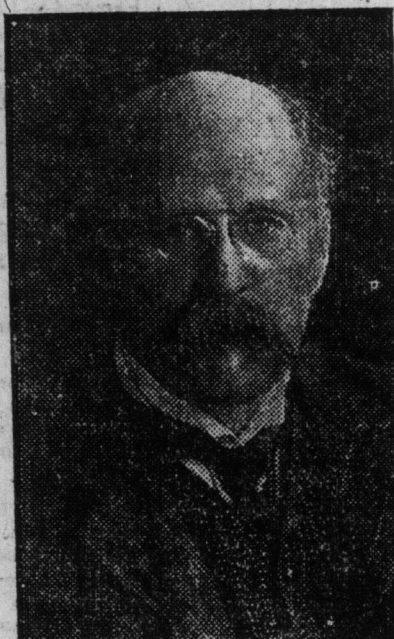

RUSSELL IN THE EAST SAYS MACHINE'S LOST

But Mr. Kemp Lays Defeat at Door of "Slandrous Methods" Employed by Opponents.

Joseph Russell, Independent Conservative, went with joy last night when he mounted the platform at his Broadview-avenue committee room to thank his supporters. Mr. Russell was visibly affected when he started to speak, and before he had proceeded a dozen words he gave way to tears, while the crowd stood in silence until he regained his composure.

"It is the proudest moment of my life, and I promise that I will devote myself to the interest of this constituency," said Mr. Russell.

"This, to an exceedingly greater degree than it is my ability to tell of at this moment," he added.

Mr. Russell said he attributed his success to the loyal support of the workmen, who shared in the privileges for which he stood, and the policies of public ownership of public utilities. The majority was a surprise, but

indicated the intelligence of the electors, who were familiar with the issues and the situation. He had expected to hold his own over the Don, but had not looked for a landslide.

A demonstration followed, and proud electors, bearing brooms and torches, quickly secured a vehicle and drove up town and halted in front of the World office.

"Speech! Speech!" came the deafening demand.

Mr. Russell in reply said: "There is nothing I can say to-night, only to thank you for the lift you gave me to-day. There is one thing, the people in East Toronto have shown that they are stronger than the machine, and the next time they will ask the people and a man who considers the interests of the people."

"The people of East Toronto have shown the machine that they won't stand for anyone only their own man, and they returned a man to-day who will fight for the people."

William Worrell, president of the East Toronto Conservative Association, declared that the days of the machine in the City of Toronto had ended, and that next election South, Centre and North Toronto would join them in victory. He predicted that Mr. Russell would make an able representative.

At the I.O.O.F. Hall, the "official" Conservative delegation received the news of defeat with little comment until Ald. W. J. Sanderson rose and opened fire on the manner in which he alleged their opponents had played the campaign game. Mr. Sanderson spoke with bitter emphasis, charging

slandrous and unfair dealings to gain their end.

A. E. Kemp, the defeated candidate, thanked those who had supported him, and said: "I take the defeat as a dead game sport, which I am."

Mr. Kemp referred to the campaign, and declared that libelous and ridiculous reports circulated by a certain element supporting Russell had doubtless had a great deal to do with his defeat. He charged Mr. Russell with responsibility for these alleged slanderous methods, and said that any man who would use such methods in a campaign was of the scum of the world. He said that Russell's utterances were an endorsement of the slanderous methods employed.

"Eight years ago, at the solicitation of Sir Charles Tupper, I entered the political field as Conservative candidate for East Toronto," said Mr. Kemp.

"I was elected, and again elected in the subsequent election. At the time I entered the field I told Sir Charles Tupper that my acceptance of the nomination meant many sacrifices—commercial and social. During the past eight years that I have represented this riding and in public life, I have sacrificed every comfort that is dear to a man, and for six months out of every twelve in that eight years I have practically had no home life. I have kept away from the bosom of my family and away from the comforts of home."

"I have done nothing in all my public career nor in my private business life of which I am ashamed. I have a campaign of slander and ridiculous lies I have been defeated, but let me tell you, gentlemen, I am still in the ring."

"It makes little difference to me whether I am the member for East Toronto or not. As far as I am personally concerned I can truthfully say that this is the greatest relief I have had in the past eight years."

Concluding, Mr. Kemp again thanked the electors who had stood by him, and said that he was as staunch a Conservative as ever, and would always remain such. His supporters cheered him loudly and proclaimed their hope of electing him four years hence.

Big Vote From Hobberlins.
The big tailoring firm of Hobberlins Bros. contributed nearly a hundred and fifty votes to swell the returns. The firm allowed their men until 2 o'clock to go out and vote. Each man voted as he liked and no questions were asked. It is estimated that the vote was about evenly divided for Grit and Tory candidates. Most of the men were driven to the polls between twelve and two.
