HYDRO-ELECTRIC FIGURES ARE PLEASING TO CITY

Engineer Sotham Submits Report - Dominion Power Co. Meeting - Barber Makes Confession

HAMILTON, Feb. 15.—(Special.)—Chairman Gardner announced at the meeting of the markets committee this afternoon that he had received an offer of the Napier-street police station property. If not wanted as a site for the new police station, the property will be sold.

William Hall, 423 North James-street, died to-night, aged 64 years. He had been a resident of this city for thirty years and had been employed by the Farmers' Dairy Co. for 25 years.

Domestic Power Annual. The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Dominion Power and Transmission Co. was held to-day and the directors in laying out a fund to the capital expenditure account, which will have the effect of increasing the amount of the stock and putting some real money into it.

Power Prices. Engineer Sotham of the hydro-electric power commission has answered a series of questions as to what would be the cost to Hamilton of taking a block of 1000 h.p. a year from the commission. He shows that without any expense to the city the commission will supply power at from \$14.75 to \$17.92 a horse-power, this price providing for the payment for the city's share of transmission line, switching station and Beach line, including expenses, line-loss, upkeep, etc.

WANT N. Y. PROMOTER FOR A CANADIAN DEAL

Nova Scotia Millionaires and Bank Are Said to Have Been Victims of One Rufus C. Mason.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—The World to-day says: R. C. Mason, promoter, convict, poet and adventurer, of many aliases, is enjoying a period of seclusion after another of his spectacular feats in high financing.

The police have received enquiries concerning Mason's character and business standing from the Royal Bank of Canada, which indicate that he has been moving in high society and playing prominent part across the border since he stepped out of the Tombs.

Mason turned up in Halifax. He was gregariously arranged. He was accompanied by two well-dressed, good-looking young men whom he described as his secretaries and treated as his social equals. One was represented as a nephew of the late James G. Blaine.

Where Mason picked up his secretaries and his money is not known. One report has it that the "grub" he had about \$500,000, and also supplied the letter which acted as an entering wedge to Halifax society.

D. Dickey was enthusiastic over the project, and as he himself could not supply a million acres, he started in to get several of the largest landholders in the province to pool their lands with him. He was to pay them \$2 an acre, turn it over to Mason at \$3.50, who in turn would sell it to the newspaper syndicate at \$5. The deal would be a good one for business for all concerned.
