

## JUSTIFIES INCREASE IN PRICE OF BREAD

Controller Cameron's Report  
Does Not Place Blame  
on Bakers.

## ADVISES HOME BAKING

Finds Against Establishing of  
Municipal Bread  
Plant.

Controller Cameron's bread report, as presented by the committee to council, justifies the recent increase in bread prices. But the advice of the committee is against any municipal bakery undertaking, and suggests that the housewife do her own baking. The report says in part:

"The bread question appeals possibly to more people than any other owing to the fact that bread is absolutely indispensable and so universally used as the principal article of food. "Butter and eggs have increased just as much as bread, and we learn that milk has increased nearly 30 per cent. Therefore, we have come to the conclusion that bread is a very small part of the general problem of the high cost of living, as nearly all foodstuffs have gone up just as much, if not more, than bread. This is a problem which is not merely of local significance, but is Dominion-wide in its scope.

"In our opinion the bread business should not be singled out as a target, but should be investigated along with all other food commodities in which

prices at the present time are deemed to be excessive. We might offer as our opinion that in order to cut the price of bread it would not be advisable to establish a municipal bread plant, but, on the other hand, we would suggest that the only way whereby the housewife can make a saving in the price of bread is for her to do her own baking. And if done economically when the fire is going for other purposes, she can, without counting the cost of labor, save from 5 to 7 cents on a large loaf of three pounds."

## CITY HALL NOTES

Ald. McBride is again out battling for jobs for returned soldiers. Yesterday he approached the mayor with regard to an arrangement whereby returned soldiers will be taken on as street car men in preference to the foreigners who are being imported.

Now that Nurses Dyke and Forsythe have received increases in salary every other woman in the department is said to be demanding a like increase. Two approached Mayor Church yesterday and pointed out that their work was just as responsible as that of the two granted increases.

Toronto's municipal legislators compare favorably to the federal statesmen in the number of sons and members serving at the front. Ottawa is represented by 50 soldiers out of a membership of 221, while council is represented by 6 soldiers out of a membership of 25. Controller Thompson is in khaki, while Aldermen Ball, Graham, Ramsden, Ryding and Wagstaffe have sons at the front.

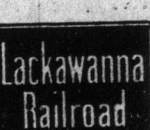

A PLEA FOR SERBIANS  
WHO ARE SUFFERING

A Home-Loving People Who Are  
in Many Ways Like to  
Canadians.

The movement to assist the Serbian  
people in the tragic distresses which  
have come to this small nation is one  
that meets a special appeal to a  
country such as Canada. Both coun-

tries are vitally interested in agricul-

ture and the successful development

of rural life. With an area less than

that of one of our smaller provinces,

such as Nova Scotia, Serbia has a

population of nearly three million

people. The mountainous inland

country nearly half its area was un-

productive, and yet, owing to its com-

munity system, the passionate love

of its people for the soil and its intensive

agriculture, Serbia possessed a great-

er number of sheep than are in the

whole of Canada, and relative to its

population a greater number of both

sheep and swine countries.

In Europe, Corn was its principal

crop and formed the chief diet of the

country people. It exported a large

amount of wheat, live stock and fruit.

We, who in this war are devoted to

the cause of small nationalities, must

peculiarly feel an appeal for the relief

of the Serbians. Nobody can forget

the insolent ultimatum which it ac-

cepted in its entirety, would have

meant the extinction of national honor

and national life. No more tragic pic-

ture has been presented to the world

than the retreat of the civil population

of Serbia over the mountains in the

wake of their army, women and chil-

dren by the thousand perishing by the

way. Today France is supporting

thousands of the Serbian children,

notwithstanding that she has between

one and two million orphans of her

own. Hundreds more are in England

being cared for and educated.
