emergency food garden commission remain in the field. of Washington, working in conjunc-tion with this newspaper in a nationwide movement to conserve the food supply. The following recipe is recommended for this bread:
2 coups peeled and sliced potato.
2 cups boiling water.

yeast cake in 1/4 cup lukewarm

Boil the potato and water and put thru a sieve or colander. While still lukewarm add the yeast dissolved in one-fourth cup of luke-warm water. Stir into this two cups of wheat flour to make a sponge. Set this sponge in a warm place to rise for about three hours. Put in a bread pan or on the bread board two cups of wheat flour and two cups of rye flour. Open, up the centra of this pile of flour and pour in the sponge. Add the sugar, sald and lard and mix all together, then knead well for about ten minutes or until it is elastic and smooth. Set to rise in a covered pan in a warm place until it doubles in bulk. Then mold into two loaves, put into well-greased pans and set to raise again until double in size. Then bake in a moderate oven for one hour. Remove loaves from pans and place them on, cloth or bread board to cool.
