REDUCES PRICE OF MILK PLACE THE BLAME FOR PAPER PRICES

> Brokers and Jobbers, Say Witnesses at Probe.

Washington, April 29.-Blame for the high price of print paper was placed primarily upon small manufacturers, brokers and jobbers, altho publishers themselves were held partly to blame by witnesses today before a senate investigating committee. Curtailed consumption, in order to break the spot market, pending increased production, was generally advocated as

a remedy. committee, all of whom virtually agreed that reduced production of paper, due to lack of understanding between the publishers and manufac-turers, together with the rapid increase in advertising since the war, had resulted in a situation of which the brokers and jobbers had taken advantage. Because of the prevailing high prices, the witnesses said, manufacturers of paper specialties had been enticed into the manufacture of print paper, which had served to aggravate the situation. The regular paper manufacturers were defended and de-
