They feel that they cannot too highly commend the fidelity, ability, and persevering exertions of the excellent Teacher Mr. Hutton. The committee were welcomed on their visit by a feeling address, written by one of the pupils on the black board referring to the pleasure they experienced from the committee's visit of last year. The Matron also discharges her duties in a highly commendable manner. All the rooms, dormitories, kitchen, school room and sitting rooms, were scrupulously neat and clean.
