BIG CHANCES FOR A TRADE WITH CUBA

Direct Monthly Steamship Service Between St. John and Havana Direct Will Go Into Effect on September 1st.

St. John shippers, and farmers and merchants throughout the province will be interested in the announcement that the St. John-Cuba steamship service will be resumed on September first.

Dr. E. S. Kirkpatrick, Canadian trade commissioner to Cuba, who went to the island a short time ago to inquire into trade conditions with the object of determining how trade between Canada and Cuba could be increased has written to several of the shippers here and states that he is strongly convinced of the desirability of having a direct service from Cuba to St. John and he realizes that such a service could not be maintained without government assistance.
