IT WAS A GOOD YEAR

For Westmorland Lobster Fishermen--The Catch Worth \$100,000

(Sackville Post.) A Port Elgin man, who has been in close touch with the lobster fishing business this summer has given the Post a number of interesting facts and figures concerning this great industry as carried on in Westmorland County.

The past season he says was a very satisfactory one, more so on the whole than the season of 1906. This year the catch more uniform throughout the season. The majority of factories got all they could take care of conveniently but at no time were they rushed. The Post's informant states that the catch of lobsters along the Westmorland shore between Bayside and a point near the Shemogue hatchery must have been worth in the vicinity of \$100,000 to those engaged in the business.

MAY BUY D. A. R.

Report That New York, New Haven and Hartford Railway Has Offered \$10,000,000 For It.

BOSTON, Sept. 18.—It is reported here that President Miller of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railway, which is in control of the Boston and Maine, has made an offer of ten million dollars for the Dominion Atlantic steamship line.

Today Charles W. Morse's new passenger line to New York begins its service with the Yale, late of the St. John route, and the Harvard, the latest acquisition to the Eastern Steamship Company's fleet.
