CLASS BY HIMSELFGreat Stallion Had a Wonderful  
Record; Paced Mile in 1.55Dan Patch, pacing stallion, owned by  
H. M. Savage of Minneapolis, which died  
of athletic heart at the owner's farm  
at Savage, Minn., recently, had a re-  
markable record. In 1906 he paced a  
mile over the Hamline track in 1.55, the  
world's sulky record. Dan Patch was  
bought by Savage for \$60,000. He was  
withdrawn from the track several years  
ago.Although veterinarians declared that  
the real cause of the famous horse's  
death was "athletic heart," he had been  
sick from inflammation of the bowels.Dan Patch was twenty years old, and  
for the last four years had been kept  
in retirement for breeding purposes only.Dan Patch was foaled April 29, 1896,  
on an Indiana farm. As a three-year-old  
he began to show his speed to his train-  
er, and the following year paced his  
maiden race over the half mile track at  
Bakewell, Ind. In all his long career on  
the turf Dan Patch never lost a race  
and he raced against all the high class  
pacers of his day.Dan Patch held many records, his  
more sensational performances being as  
follows: One mile in 1.55, one mile in  
1.55, two miles in 1.56, three miles in  
1.56, fourteen miles averaging 1.56, a  
thirty miles averaging 1.57, forty-five  
miles averaging 1.57, twenty-fiveaveraging 1.59, 120 miles, averaging  
2.20, 182 miles, averaging 2.04, low-  
ered world's records fourteen times,  
mile record, 1906, 1.55; mile wagon re-

SYSTEM OF DECIDING

PENNANT RACES

In view of the apparent ease with  
which a ball club can be knocked from  
leadership into nothing by a series of  
accidents and also in view of the fact  
that a ball club, getting a bad start, has  
little or no interest in a big league race,  
Capt. Huston and other magnates are  
discussing a plan for changing the sys-  
tem of deciding pennants and world's  
championships that may revolutionize  
modern baseball, writes Bosman Bulger  
in the New York Evening World.The plan, heartily approved by Gar-  
ry Herrmann, chairman of the national  
commission, contemplates dividing the  
regular season of six months into two  
pennant races of seventy games each.  
One season is to begin in April and end  
July 1, the other going from then until  
October 1. In other words, a pennant  
race will be decided by July 1 and a  
real one start all over again. If two  
clubs win championships in each of the  
two leagues they are to play off in the  
same game series to see which club may  
be the winner of the opposition in a series  
for the world's championship.This plan has been tried in minor  
leagues and met with considerable suc-
