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BARK GOES ASHORE NEAR PASPEBIAC Halifax, N. S., June 3.—(Special)—The bark C. R. C., 241 tons, Capt. T. J. Brent, belonging to the C. Robin Colles Co., Ltd., Halifax, went ashore eighteen miles from Paspebiac at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning and is likely to be a total wreck. The seas were dashing over her when the crew left four hours later.

They rowed and sailed to Paspebiac and some members of the crew arrived in Halifax last evening, bringing tidings of the wreck. It was foggy at the time of the accident.

The C. R. C. was bound from Barbados to Paspebiac. She had a valuable cargo of molasses and sugar. The firm carried insurance. The crew, all foreigners, all reached shore safely.
