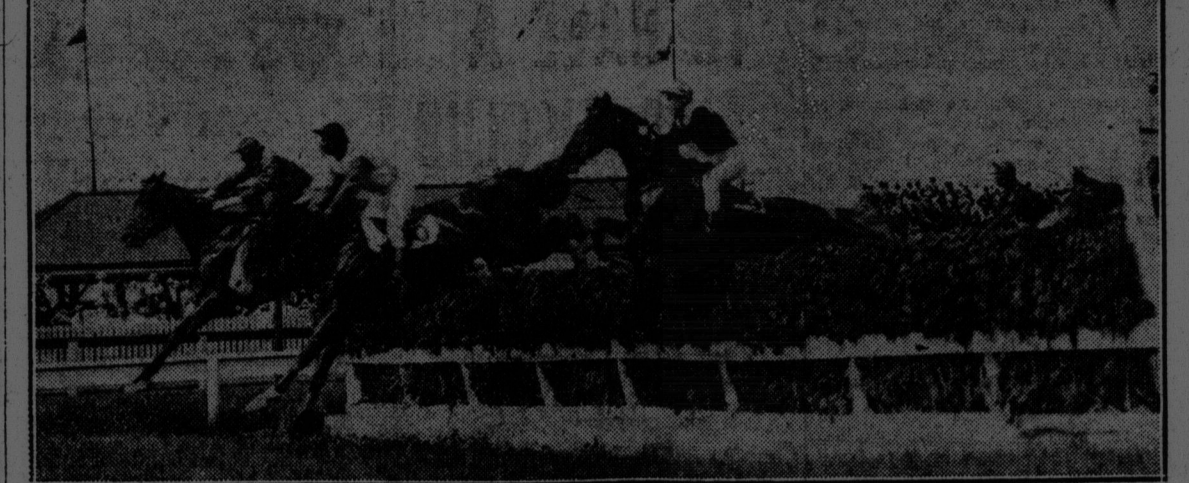
GO TO THE TEMPLE FOR A LAUGH.

CHINA GETS MORE OPIUM IN SPITE OF RESTRICTIONS

Increased Price Induces Extra Supply—A Check Put on China by Great Britain
Pekin, June 30.—According to the returns of the Imperial Maritime Customs, the amount of Indian opium brought into China in 1909, the second year of the China-British reduction agreement, was valued at 1,000,000,000 taels, or 100,000,000 pounds, in 1908, though the returns for 1908 had shown the promised diminution from the figures of 1907. It is believed that the increase is being maintained, though the reduction agreement was not yet in force. The price of the drug, which has been advanced seven or eight times since the reduction agreement went into effect, is the reason for the endeavor on the part of Indian merchants to keep up the trade. The necessity for the increase in the importation of opium is due to the drastic suppression of home cultivation of the poppy. There are instances where farmers who defied the imperial edict prohibiting planting.

The British legation here does not deny the accuracy of the general statement of the Imperial Maritime Customs, but points out that the present enormous profits to be derived from the sale of opium cause temptations of the drug to be made to China from all parts of the globe, the material being originally intended for medicinal purposes. The Chinese government at present is in a controversy with Great Britain over the question of provincial monopolies, which, the government contends will enable it to control the sale of the drug to licensed persons only.

The British Legation, however, says it cannot trust the Chinese to fulfill their pledges, and therefore will not permit control of the traffic to pass into their hands. It is contended also that China is unable to act contrary to treaty rights of former years giving trading privileges to the British at all treaty ports. The British legation here says that the Chinese themselves have been largely instrumental in the growth of what now have become vested rights, and that these must be protected.
