During the day (yesterday) a great number of our citizens and others called on the remaining members of the English crew at Glamorgan House and expressed their regret at the sad occurrence which had taken place, and so greatly marred the otherwise auspicious circumstances of the occasion.

The character of the betting yesterday at the race course was not materially different from that reported in these columns.
