Premier Replies to Charges Made by Rev. Mr. Goodwin

Challenges Statements Made Rev. Mr. Goodwin by Clergyman in Hartland Address

Commissioners Ask Name of Vendor and Full Investigation Promised-Debate on Address Ended.

A spirited and indignant reply on the part of Premier Veniot was made in the House yesterday in regard to the charges reported to have been made by Rev. H. A. Goodwin, of St. John, in an address at Hartland this week, that the Government had control of

in an address at Hartland this week, that the Government had control of the liquor interests, that the Premier wanted a law here like that in British Columbia and that the commission encouraged the sale of liquor for revenue purposes. At the same time the liquor commission was taking steps to bring the allegations to a showdown. A letter has been forwarded by the commission to Rev. Mr. Goodwin.

"I hope," declared the Premier, "that Mr. Goodwin has not been correctly reported because his statements are unjust, unfair and untrue. Ever since I assumed the leadership of this government on February first, last, I have striven to enforce the prohibition law to the fullest extent. I challenge any many to point to any utterance of mine since I assumed the office of Prime Minister that could be interpreted as meaning that I expected, desired or hoped for the introduction into this province of 'a liquor law such as they have in British Columbia.' He said that when he assumed the leadership of the government, he declared that he would put forth every effort to have the present act enforced and, as he said the other day, if after a genuine and honest effort to enforce the law has been made and been found ineffective showing that the fault was in the law and not in its enforcement, then he would call together the various interests concerned to try to find some plan that would be satisfactory.

Name of Vendor.

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"If Mr. Goodwin will reveal the name of the vendor who made the charges," said Hon. Mr. Veniot, "and if that vendor will prove that any liquor commissioner told him to sell liquor illegally since I assumed the direction of this Government in February, then I shall dismiss that commissioner so fast that he will not realize he ever was a commissioner."

From the day that he became Premier, he had made an honest effort to enforce the act he declared, and the results were seen in the many commendatory resolutions and letters that he had since received from various individuals and organizations.

Mr. Veniot's spirited defence of his administration was frequently interrupted by applause from the House.

At the conclusion of Mr. Veniot's defence today, D. A. Stewart, Conservative, Campbellton, spoke in the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne. His address was characterized by more vigor than has been displayed so far this week by any of the Opposition.

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Mr. Stewart's speech concluded the debate, and on motion of J. A. McKenna, Liberal, Sussex, and Dr. L. J. Violette, Liberal, St. Leonards, the reply to the speech from the throne was adopted and a committee to carry the reply to the Lieutenant-Governor provided for. The House then adjourned until tomorrow afternoon.

Hon, Mr. Robinson presented the sixty-second annual report of the department of lands and mines.

Hon, Mr. Byrne gave notice that on Tuesday next he would move for suspension of the rule to permit of the introduction of a bill to amend the Church of England Act.

Hon, Mr. Veniot said that on Tuesday next a motion would be made for the extension of the time for the introduction of private bills, but there would be no further extension.



The total number of bushels of grain shipped from the C. N. R. elevator to date is 1,800,000, with a half million on the road and the same amount in the elevator awaiting shipment.
