The Baptist church at Paradise has
just closed a week's meetings which
was participated in by the Bridgetown
and Lawrencetown churches. The
evangelist, Rev. D. P. Brown, of Boston,
being present at the Western Baptist
Association, held recently at Brookfield,
Queens Co., he presented his creden-
tials to the brethren; a committee was
appointed to examine them, who re-
ported favorably, and Bro. Brown was
heartily endorsed by the Association.
The pastors and delegates from the above
named churches united in inviting him
to conduct a series of meetings with
us. Accordingly, he has been with us
and his work has been highly gratify-
ing in its results. Mr. Brown's work is
of a high order and his methods most
judicious. Possessed of a good com-
mand of language, and addresses his
audience in such a manner as to be clearly
understood. His sermons are strong,
logical and truthful, and full of fervent
prayerfulness. His faith in what he
preaches, and in the office and power of
the Holy Spirit to apply the most un-
welcome truths to the hearts of his
hearers is particularly noticeable. En-
tirely free from cant and scholasticism,
his preaching is of an exceptional quality
of style. He preaches the stern old-fash-
ioned doctrines of sin and repentance.
His is well rounded, general, energetic
and tender towards all. His sermons
on the revival of church life without aim-
ing to put all Christians into the same
mould of experience. The effect of
his work is to strengthen confidence in
the church, and to put moral fiber into
the consciences.

In personal appearance Mr. Brown is
a little above medium height, is well
formed, attractive in appearance, has
a frank open countenance with intelli-
gent kindly eyes. He is 33 years of
age. He is married, and his
home is in Boston. He was born in
Pleasant, Jefferson Co., N. Y.; received
his education at Rochester, N. Y.;
studied law at Adams, N. Y., and later
graduated from Rochester Theological
Seminary and was pastor for six years
in his native State and missionary for
two years to Iowa before taking up
evangelistic work. He comes from a
family of evangelists, being the grand-
son of Rev. G. Brown, also an evangelist to
the churches. The Standard of Chicago,
June 14, 1892, speaking of Mr.
Brown's work says, "The work of Mr.
Brown has been often mentioned in the
Standard, and in terms to justify con-
fidence in him as a highly efficient and
successful man." Rev. F. D. Herr, D.
D., pastor of the Central Baptist church,
Norwich, Conn., says, "He is one of the
safest and best men we have in his
line in our whole denomination." Bro.
Brown is a popular open air preacher,
and we would suggest the grouping of
several churches in four days' meeting.
Pastors and churches need not assume
