CARS COLLIDE, EIGHT LOCAL YOUTHS HURT

Burns Hay has broken leg, Alice Matheson fractures vertebrae, and James Neville fractures collar bone. The other injured.

NEAR ST. DAVID, Me

Eight young people of this town received serious injuries in an automobile accident Friday night, when returning home after a trip to Van Buren, Me. One of the injured, Burns Hay, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. N. Hay, suffered a fractured leg. Alice Matheson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Matheson has broken vertebrae, her sister Cecilia, serious cuts and bruises, Henry Lachance, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmond Lachance, vertebrae displaced, James Neville, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Neville, of Madawaska, Maine, fracture of the collar bone, Floyd Reed, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Reed, a broken "Peters", both of St. John, N. B. guests of the Matheson family, serious injuries of internal nature.

The party, occupying a Pontiac Sedan, were on their way back to Edmundston, by the U. S. highway, when motoring up a hill in the village of St. David, the car collided with a Ford Coupe, apparently on the wrong side of the road. Both cars upset into the ditch.

The Ford passengers, D. Dube and F. R. Cyr, both residents of St. David, disappeared from the scene of the accident, before any help had been given to the Pontiac occupants.

Rev. Father Hevey, parish priest of St. David, was one of the first to bring help to the victims.

He took them all in his car to the Edmundston Private Hospital, where Dr. P. H. Laporte was called to attend immediately.

The following day, five of the victims were taken to the local radiologist, Dr. A. M. Sornany, for X ray examinations. Although all of the injured are now out of danger, some of them, it is expected, will have long convalescence.

According to reports here, American Traffic officers are pursuing the occupants of the Ford car.

DEPRESSION AND MOTOR COMPETITION SERIOUSLY AFFECTING RAILWAYS

Re-arrangement of Train Services on Atlantic Region C.N.R. in effect September 27th.

Moncton, N.B., Sept. 16th.—Owing to the economic depression which is at present being felt all over the world, the railways have been compelled to reduce their train services to a considerable extent. In addition to this, the railways have experienced more or less severe competition from the motor bus and private automobile with the result that there has been a serious depletion in passenger train earnings.

Since the depression set in, passenger train service mileage on the Canadian National Railways has been reduced at the rate of 4,370,000 miles per annum. The greater part of this reduction has taken place in territory outside of the Maritimes. Further reductions have been made imperative and in an endeavour to relieve the situation, train services on the Atlantic Region have been re-arranged to take effect with the change of time Sunday, September 27th.

The changes covered by this re-arrangement provide for the cancellation of Trains Nos. 9 and 10 operating between Truro and Saint John to minimize the effect of the cancellation of these trains. Train No. 43, now leaving Moncton daily except Sunday at 4:30 P. M., will leave at 10:30 P. M., thus providing through service to Saint John from Halifax with the Maritime Express. This train will arrive Saint John at 1:30 A. M. The suburban service between Hampton and Saint John which has been served by Trains Nos. 9 and 10 will be taken care of by a suburban train operating between these points.

The connection provided by Train No. 43 at Moncton with the Ocean Limited from Montreal will be taken care of by Train No. 13 which will leave Moncton at 3:30 P. M., daily instead of 2:45 P. M., as at present, arriving Saint John at 6:30.

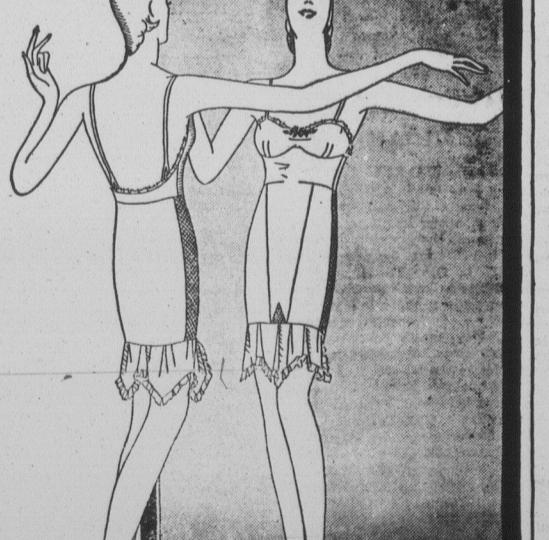
