

A Happy Reunion of Former N. B. People In Vancouver, July 1

New Brunswick Ass'n of British Columbia get together to celebrate Dominion Day—Happy days in the Province by the Sea recalled—Dr. D. J. Brydone Jack is chosen President.

Not since Dominion Day, 1913, have the political, social, religious and athletic affairs of the province of New Brunswick received so much serious attention in Vancouver as they did at Second Beach on Wednesday when members of the New Brunswick Association of B. C. gathered in knots in various parts of the grounds, could be heard expressing astonishment that such and such a lad who had apparently never displayed the slightest intelligence before the speaker had left the home town, was now the chief and wealthiest man in it. Newcomers were sought out by members of the city and drained of the last drop of information concerning the political struggles of the town of Perth, with a population of 1700 or thereabouts, the social standing of a former school mate in St. John, the metropolis of the province or some common acquaintance of another village.

There were many reunions of old friends during the afternoon and such was the general spirit of a big family party among the two or three hundred picnickers that by the time the basket suppers together with the staples prepared by the management committee had been disposed of hardly an alumni of one town was there but knew every other native of that town on the beach. The election of officers resulted in the elevation of Dr. D. J. Brydone Jack, formerly of Moncton, to the presidency, succeeding Dr. W. D. Brydone-Jack. Other officers are Messrs. A. J. Blackhall, president, second vice-president; W. R. McMurray, Woodstock, third vice-president, and Hedley S. Hipwell, St. John, secretary-treasurer.

DUFFERIN TERRACE AT QUEBEC AFIRE

Quebec, July 9.—The Dufferin Terrace, Quebec's famous promenade overlooking the St. Lawrence, caught fire today. Fanned by a strong wind the fire gained headway and in a few minutes the promenade had collapsed in an hour, and fears were entertained for the C. P. R. hotel, Chateau Frontenac. At three p. m. the progress of the fire was held up by tearing up the board walk. One third of the terrace had been destroyed and four houses partially destroyed. The damage to the terrace was about \$5,000, while the loss on the two houses burned is in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

H. R. EMMERSON DIED YESTERDAY

A Prominent Figure in the Public Life of New Brunswick—Premier of Province for a Term—A Brilliant Career Closed.

Dorchester, N. B., July 9.—The death of Hon. Henry Robert Emmerson, M. P., for Westmorland, occurred at 11:20 o'clock this morning. He passed a restless night, remaining conscious until the last. Mr. Emmerson leaves an aged mother, his sister, Mrs. H. Atkinson, Ottawa, four daughters, Mrs. F. H. Deacon, Mrs. J. Correll, Amherst, Mrs. H. K. Doves, Ottawa, and Miss Bernice at home, and one son, Henry R. Emmerson. Those mentioned here were all present when Mr. Emmerson passed peacefully away, except his son Henry. The place and date of interment have not yet been decided upon.

Hon. Henry Robert Emmerson, LL. B., M. A., LL. D., K. C., was the son of the late Rev. R. H. Emmerson, Baptist clergyman, and Augusta Read, daughter of the late Joseph Read, of Minidie, Cumberland Co., N. S. He was born at Mauderville, Sunbury Co., on September 25, 1813, and was educated at St. Joseph's College in Miramichi, Amherst Academy in Nova Scotia, Mount Allison Academy in Sackville, Horton Academy and Acadia College in Wolfville, Nova Scotia. He attended the Boston University Law School, and was graduated with the degree of LL. B. in 1837, and was called to the Bar of his native province in the following year. In addition to his law practice, he had other important business interests, among them being the general management of the New Brunswick Petroleum Company, Limited, and the Record Foundry and Machine Company. He was a member of the Baptist church and had been for several years on the Board of Governors of Acadia University. He married, in 1838, Emily C. Record, daughter of the late C. B. Record, of Moncton, N. B. Mrs. Emmerson is a niece dead. Five children survive.

Mr. Emmerson had been a supporter of the Liberal party all his life. In 1847 he was put forward by the Liberals of Westmorland county Mr. Josiah Wood. He sitting Conservative member, and was defeated. In 1858 he was elected to the Provincial Legislature for Albert county, but was defeated in 1860. In 1861 he became a member of the Legislative Council and there he advocated the abolition of that body, which took effect in 1872. Prior to that time he had entered the Blair administration as president of the Executive Council and leader of the government of the Upper House. He became Commissioner of Public Works under Mr. Blair in 1872, and on the resignation of Hon. James Mitchell from the Premiership in 1873, he became Premier, and in the succeeding election carried forty-one seats out of forty-six in the House of Assembly. He resigned the Premiership in September, 1890, and ran in Westmorland for the House of Commons, carrying that county against H. A. Pearce, who had represented it in the Conservative representation which had continued for eighteen years, resigning in 1907. Since the defeat of the Liberal administration he had been one of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's chief lieutenants.

The Carleton Orchest Band was in attendance and the catering was looked after by Sharpe. SCENE AT INQUEST INTO THE MURDER OF MRS. LOUISE BAILEY



Mrs. Florence Conklin Carman was identified positively from the witness stand at the coroner's inquest at Freeport, L. I., as having entered the consulting room of her husband's office while Mrs. Louise Bailey lay dead on the floor of the room from a shot fired through a window in the Carman residence. This testimony, shorn of the dramatic incidents it was expected to develop, was in flat contradiction of the testimony given later by Mrs. Carman herself, whose appearance as a witness at the inquest furnished the first glimpse of her to the townsfolk since Mrs. Bailey was slain. It bore even greater force when it was seen that it stood out in direct contradiction as well of the testimony of Dr. Carman and Mrs. Carman's sister, Mrs. Ida Powell, all of whom were in the Carman residence when the fatal shot was fired. In the above scene are shown Dr. Carman as he appeared at the inquest; coroner North, who presided; Roland Lamb, Freeport Chief of Police, who denied that any person in the Carman household is under surveillance for the murder, and George M. Levy, friend and attorney for both Dr. and Mrs. Carman.

SIXTY-SEVEN PRISONERS IN THE COUNTY JAIL

Seven Are Under the Age of Twenty and Six are Women.

CANADIAN PRESS ASS'N OPENS FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING

Proposed Advance in Postal Rates on Newspapers Forms Topic for Discussion—Officers Elected.

Toronto, July 9.—The fifty-sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association opened in the King Edward Hotel today when there was a large representation of publishers and editors from all portions of the Dominion. At the joint meeting in the morning the proposed advance in postal rates was discussed, and resolutions were passed to the effect that the executive committee approved of the position taken by the postal committee in respect to the House of Commons Bill No. 147, and was of the opinion that the control of the newspaper rates should remain with parliament and not be vested in one or a few ministers. In the afternoon the association broke up into three sections. In the division relating to daily newspapers an important feature was the recommendation of the advertising committee that all commissions and reductions in rates on Canadian patent medicine or other general advertising not placed through recognized advertising agencies be eliminated after expiry of existing contracts and that short rates be enforced generally. On this subject a form of agreement between newspaper publishers and the Canadian Press Association, as represented by its advertising committee, was handed around, and some of those present signed it.

GOOD ADVICE FOR BUYERS OF BLACK FOXES

Frank Tuplin again points to proper methods of acquiring new Foxes for breeding.

Frank F. Tuplin's advice to the man about to start in the fox business is "First buy the best animals you can get for the smallest amount of money possible, this is business, but you must not lose sight of the fact that a thousand dollars right here, is nothing to get a proper start, for if a man does not commence anything right he will be seriously handicapped in his future business."

"Second, the ordinary purchaser of black, black and silver foxes as they are sold today in Canada, is entirely at the mercy of the man from whom he buys. He may have an expert knowledge of other kinds of stock, such as horses, cattle, dogs, etc., but know absolutely nothing of the differences in qualities which go to make up a first class black or silver fox. Nor is it enough to ask the vendor to show his account sales of the skins he has shipped to London, for while the account sales of skins may be pleasing to you, you want to be sure you are getting the same blood as appears in the account sales."

"Third, a man who thinks of entering into a business of which he is comparatively ignorant should first study and weigh all sides of the matter."

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
