British Protestant Churches Issue Special Appeals to Their Adherents

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FLEMMING'S DENIAL IS MADE BY MR. CLARKE

Valley Bill Advanced a Stage and Legislature Adjourns Till Wednesday

Dugal Moves His Grave Charges and Speaks in Support of Them, and Premier's Advocates Reply—Mr. Flemming Too Ill to Appear—Stewart and Swim Condemn Valley Bill and Others Support It—Royal Commission Expected Next Week—The \$2,000,000 Deal Must Wait Now.

Fredericton, April 9—The presentation of Mr. Dugal's charges, a general denial by Premier Flemming, made in person but through Attorney-General Clarke, and the passage of the Valley railway bill through committee stage—such was the history of the assembly this afternoon and this evening.

The house adjourned at midnight until next Wednesday evening. Mr. Dugal's charges are to come up then, and presumably the government will then announce what form of tribunal it will deal with. Presumably it will be a royal commission, preferably the judges. The Valley bill may be given its third reading then, but it is felt that it will not be passed until the Dugal charges are dealt with.

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ARNOLD'S SLAYER FOUND GUILTY

REPORT REBELS TAKE TAMPICO Sentenced to Death July 9

Story Cannot Be Verified, Although Fierce Fighting Has Been Going On

GREAT PROPERTY LOSS Fire from Mexican Warships Caused Disaster to Their Own Side—Vila Persuaded British Consul to Carry Demand for Surrender of Torreon, After a Warm Session.

Veracruz, April 9.—The United States consulate has received word from the consular agent at Tampico that grave rumors are current there that Tampico has fallen. While there is no confirmation of this, it is known there has been serious fighting between the Federals and rebels around that port.

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Krafchenko Declares He is Innocent of the Crime

Tells Court He Was Present During Robbery of the Bank But That Three Other Men Were With Him and He Did No Shooting—Confesses to Many Crimes but Never Shed Blood.

(Canadian Press.) Montreal, May, April 9—Three months from today, on July 9, John Krafchenko is to be hanged at Winnipeg for the murder, on Dec. 3 last year, of H. M. Arnold, manager of the Bank of Montreal at Plum Coulee, Man. The close of a long and sensational trial at 4 o'clock this afternoon, when the court met after a two-hour intermission which followed the jury's verdict of guilty.

When the court resumed Krafchenko made a statement to the court in which he did not deny that he had been concerned in the hold-up of the bank, but asserted positively he was not the man who killed Arnold. Chief Justice Matheson imposed sentence. From the moment of the reading of the indictment Krafchenko was very quiet, and preserved the same steady attitude, and he showed little or no emotion, even when the death penalty was pronounced.

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MONTREAL NOW WITHOUT CIVIC ADMINISTRATION

Bungle in Election Count Will Delay New Regime Assuming Office for Three Weeks

(Canadian Press.) Montreal, April 9—Owing to the bungling that had taken place in counting the votes cast at the municipal elections on Monday last, and the necessity of a recount, this city will be without an official administration for three weeks.

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
