





WAR LOAN \$100,000,000

Ottawa, Dec. 3-The government has decided to make the Canadian war loan \$100,000,000 instead of \$50,000,000. The extra \$50,000,000 will be obtained from the sixty-odd millions of over-subscrip-tions to the original loan. and will be used as a credit for the imperial treasury to pay for shells, munitions and other war supplies ordered by the imperial government.




