Knox Church Young People's Society of Christian Endeayor was organized on Nev. last and has a membership of 62, divided as follows :

Fifty active members, who are pledged to attend the meetings and take part either by praver, testimony or by giving some thought on the topic of the meeting, and twelve associate members, who are not so pledged but are privileged to take part if so disposed.
