And whereas for paying the interest and creating an equal yearly sinking tund for paying the said sum of \$4500 and interest as hereinafter mentioned, it will require an equal annual special rate of not more than four one-half mills in the dollar in addition to all rates to be levied in each year.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the village of Carleton Place, aforesaid, and it is hereby enacted by the authority aforesaid:—
