## Will Act With Full Military Force

### CHANCELLOR EBERT ANNOUNCES.

London, Jan. 7.—The Ebert Government has decided to act with its full military force to crush the uprising of Spartacists and as a result the anarchy and civil war in Berlin is to-night near a crisis, according to dispatches reaching here. Order, however, is not expected before hundreds are added to the dead, who by soverers have already been killed in the street fighting between the Government troops and the adherents of Dr. Liebknecht's group. The only occurrence that will prevent serious bloodshed is that surrender of the Spartacists.

### Loath To Act.

Until last night Premier Ebert was opposed to using extreme force against the revolutionists. He held to the belief that the uprising would die of itself because of the strong popular support of the Government. This view he gave up successfully to the central council of soldiers and workers. Yesterday, however, the trouble grew worse. The Spartacists, with the most of the civil buildings in their possession, seized the Reichbank. Last evening the central council realized vigorous action was necessary, and decided to use all military forces to end the uprising.

Gustav Noske has been appointed commander-in-chief of the Government troops, which have been brought to the center of the city and concentrated near the chancellors palace. Pedestrians are reported to have been ordering of the general railway executives and are also holding the main telegraph office. Twenty of their men were permitted by Government troops to enter the building in order to make sure that there might be no further shooting of the streets and all windows have been closed. The Government has refused to negotiate with the Spartacists, and the opposing forces face each other along the Wilhelmstrasse, a distance of about one-half mile, with a zone only 100 yards in width. Encounters of a decisive nature are reported as being imminent.

## INDIA NATIONALISTS DEMAND AUTONOMY.

London, Jan. 8.—A dispatch from Reuters Delhi correspondent announces that at the nationalist Congress held there a motion in favor of full provincial autonomy and against special electorates for Europeans was carried by acclamation. The Congress passed formal resolutions of loyalty.

## Is Former Czar Still Alive?

### RUSSIAN COUNT SAID TO HAVE BEEN THE VICTIM.

London, Jan. 8.—According to a story sent by a special correspondent of The Morning Post at Archangel—which it is necessary to treat with reserve—the former Emperor of Russia is still alive. The correspondent telegraphs: "A friend of mine, Prince M., who has just arrived here from Petrograd, informed me that he had a long talk with Grand Duke Cyril on November 18. The duke told him that he had just received a letter from Grand Duchess Tatiana, daughter of the emperor, who wrote that the emperor and her daughters were still alive and that the emperor had not been shot."

### Wanted A Victim.

"The Bolshevik officer who was ordered to carry out the sentence of death told the emperor that it was a matter of indifference to him whether he was shot. He had orders to produce a corpse—bullet in the head of a victim would make identification impossible. "Count T., who was present at the conversation, offered to sacrifice himself, saying he considered it was his duty to lay down his life for his sovereign. The emperor protested strongly, but was overruled by Count T. and the officer. The emperor escaped, but no one knows where he is at the present time. "Sir Botkin has also written to his sister to the effect that the greatest crime of the twentieth century has miscarried."

## URGES CANADIAN FISH.

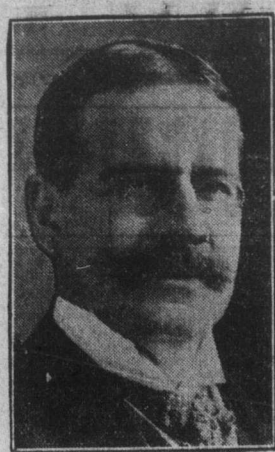
### Of Great Value to People of Motherland at Present Time, says Earl.

## DISCOVERED CAR OF LIQUOR.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The robbing of a car of "crookery" in the station yard of the Grand Trunk here, carried out so roughly that some of the remaining goods were broken, reduced to a considerable extent the prospective liquor supplies of Kitchener. Last night Grand Trunk men found liquor leaking out of a car filled with cases labelled "crookery." Investigation showed that two cases had been removed, but the rest were filled with rice and whiskey, the whole worth about \$10,000. It was shipped by "M. Casselman," a resident of Montreal, to Kitchener. The liquor is now in the possession of the Ontario License Board.
