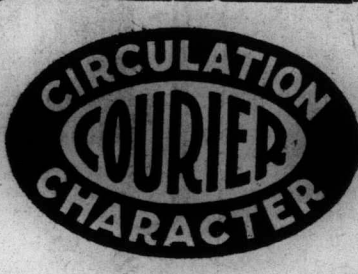

### CHICAGO MAYOR IS PRO-GERMAN

Constantine of Greece No Truer Friend of Kaiser Than Thompson

For several months past two American mayors have been much in the public eye. One of them is Mayor Mitchell, of New York, descendant of an Irish Fenian; the other is William Hale Thompson, Mayor of Chicago, latter of New England lineage. The one has been a constant example of sound Americanism, loyalty, wisdom and courtliness. The other has been a fine specimen of pro-Germanism. Constantine of Greece was no stancher ally of the Kaiser than Mayor Thompson of Chicago. One of them was influenced by his wife; the other has been influenced by a Swedish, the Lundin who believes that Thompson's course will prove satisfactory to a majority of the citizens of Illinois, and may result in his becoming a United States Senator. He knows as well as any one else that Thompson has about as much chance of being elected Mayor of Chicago again as he has of being elected Mayor of Toronto. Nevertheless, he holds that the Senatorship is a different matter.

Elected by Anti-Germans

There is much talk now of impending Thompson among the municipal affairs of the city. It is also talk of the Federal Government prosecuting him. Either course of action would be very popular in Chicago. When the British and French missions were in the United States not long ago the Mayor opposed the suggestion that Marshal Joffre and Mr. Balfour should be invited to Chicago, the Mayor's presence might offend the German citizens. The city council, however, repudiated him, and by unanimous vote extended the invitation. Later on, when the nation was in the throes of the Liberty Loan campaign, Thompson refused to permit bond solicitors to go through the city hall. He himself subscribed for no bond, though he is a millionaire. The most remarkable fact about the pro-Germanism is that he was elected Mayor of Chicago by the greatest majority on record as a protest against the efforts of the American citizens to control the city's affairs. His first exhibition of pro-Germanism, therefore, was hardly less astounding than if it had been displayed by our own Mayor of Toronto.

Had White House Hopes

In 1915 Thompson was given credit for settling the big Chicago street car strike. His own sympathies would have been with the company, for he belongs to the capitalist class, but Lundin calculated that it would be more popular to side with the workers. So he persuaded Thompson to take this line, and eventually the men got a substantial therefore, was astounding.

An excursion to the West was arranged for the purposes of creating a Thompsonian party. It was killed off by the Eastland disaster. Later on a second trip was proposed, but it was felt that some striking act on the part of the Mayor was necessary if he was to get the reputation of West that he craved. It was decided to close the hotels on Sunday, and this was done. The license laws. The decision was announced at a night Council meeting. The Mayor, his adviser, Lundin, and the "bunch" took the next train for the arid West, carrying along enough "hoose" to float a dreadnought.

Broke Pledge to "Wets"

The "wet" in Chicago were furious, since they had helped elect Thompson, who had never posed as a friend of the "drys." On the contrary, he had been a constant enemy of the "drys." The points was that he was "a good mixer, one of the boys" in every sense of the word. Means of getting back at him were devised, and when he made his first stop at Chicago, he was confronted with a statement that before the election he had pledged himself to the "drys" and to enforce blue laws and that Sunday closing is not a blue law Chicago would like to know what color it sails under since it was never got on the job. The Mayor said that he did not remember giving a pledge; later on he suggested that he had done so when not feeling well. The move, however, was an unfortunate one. The "dry" West set him down as a welder, and his tour was a failure. Back home the "drys" were enraged at the evidence that he had pledged himself to the "wets" even if he had gone back on his promise. They forsook him completely, when in further fondering efforts to square himself he hinted that his political enemies would have indicted him if he had not closed the hotels. In the end he got no credit from either party for his spectacular move.

Called Chicago a German City

Lundin, the Mayor's political adviser, is supposed to be a politician of unusual smoothness. He was once a Congressman, but has no longer any political ambitions for himself. His aim is to be the power behind the throne. Thompson, himself, is credited with unusual doggedness, and few other qualities generally admired. He is, however, a "sticker" of unusual merit. Often he spoils the well-laid schemes of Lundin by blurring out some tactless thing, that "Chicago was the sixth largest German city in the world," and this when the United States was at war with Germany. These "breaks" however, he denies. He declines to give interviews to the press. When he has anything to say

### ALL GERMANS ARE WARNED

To Keep off the New York Water Front Those Who Disobey Will Be At Once Arrested

By Courier Leased Wire. New York, July 11.—A further move to keep the water front free from enemy aliens was made today when placards warning all Germans to keep off, were distributed to all docks and piers in this city and Long Island points. It was said similar notices would be sent to points on the Hudson River and the Connecticut shore before the end of this week. No rule has yet been issued, closing the big skyscraper buildings along the harbor front to alien enemies, and it was said no such move was contemplated for the present at least. It was also said that the ferries would not be closed to the alien enemy, but that the stage of the island ferry was closed.
