The new church at Lyle hill, in the Templepatrick Presbytery, which occupies the site of the old meeting-house in which the first secession congregation in Ireland worshipped, has just been opened by the Moderator of the Assembly.

The first number of *The Princeton College Bulletin* is out. It is the official journal of Princeton College, and is edited by President Patton. Several of the leading professors of the college are contributors. It contains, besides information about the college, scientific and philosophical papers from the professors. It is to be issued quarterly.

The Presbyterians of Newry, Templepatrick and Route, have held the conference on Missions directed by the Assembly. The meetings have been well attended, very interesting papers have been read and addresses delivered, and a much more intelligent and practical interest in the home and foreign missions of the Church has been evoked.

In the paper read before the Glasgow branch of the Educational Institute of Scotland, Rev. David Hunter, referring to the narrow range of culture provided in Scottish Universities, said it would be an immense gain to the churches if their clergymen received varieties of culture. He knew that in the Church of Scotland a permissible increase in the range of study would be welcomed.

By the will of the late Mr. James Smith, of Forbes-road, Edinburgh, upwards of £14,000 falls to be divided among the various schemes of the Free Church. To Free St. George's, of which he was a member, Mr. Smith has left £1,000 for the poor of the congregation. A sum of £6,000 is to be applied to the building of a new church in or near Edinburgh, one condition of this bequest being that a bust of the donor must be placed in the porch of the church.

In an address at the anniversary of St. Andrew's Free Church, Kilmarnock, Dr. Adam, of Glasgow, spoke of the improvements made in ecclesiastical buildings in recent years, and declared that the parish churches in which he used to worship as a boy would not be tolerated at the present time. No small advance, too, had been made in their mode of worship. It was more varied, more instructive, and more impressive than at any former period. The pastor, Mr. Hugh Ross, announced that during the past two years they had cleared a debt of £3,600.

In 1888 to 1889, the membership of the Free Presbyterian Churches increased from less than 10,000 to 12,000, and of the Sunday-school scholars from 15,000 to nearly 18,000. Gifts for missions have increased from £25,000 to £35,000; to Home Missions £10,000 to £15,000; congregational £10,000 to £15,000; and to other charities from less than £10,000 to more than £23,000.

The Church of England has six thousand clergymen, and about 470,000 members in New South Wales. The divisions of Methodists in New South Wales—Wesleyan, Primitive, and United Free—have 89,000 members. There are altogether 4,302 churches in New South Wales, capable of seating 306,373 persons, and to which are attached 1,040 registered ministers, and a large number of miscellaneous students at present pursuing theological courses among the Protestant churches in France exceed two hundred. Besides these there are a number of churches in Germany, Switzerland, and Scotland. In the Reformed Church of France the majority of the members, which a few years ago was evangelical or indifferent have become evangelical. The Sunday-school has greatly increased, and the influence of the Church is steadily growing.

Dr. Wm. J. Holland, pastor of the Bellefield Presbyterian church, of Pittsburgh, Pa., has received a flatulent offer from the United States Government. About a year ago Dr. Holland was selected as naturalist to accompany a Government expedition to Japan, and it was in this work that he made valuable discoveries in entomology. So exhaustive have Dr. Holland's reports been pronounced that the Government has thought best to prosecute further researches in this direction. The offer he has recently received from the Government is for a tour to the West Coast of Africa for which he is offered \$10,000 per annum, including expenses.

Oris Gibson, of New York, who died recently, was a Chinese mission work on the Western Coast. He was born in New York county, N.Y., in 1827. His parents were natives of New England. He graduated from Dickinson College in Pennsylvania, in 1854, and was sent to Foo Chow, China, by the Mission Society of the Methodist Church. There he labored for ten years as teacher and evangelist, and familiarized himself with the Chinese language. He was sent to New York in 1865, and in 1866 he was sent to California by the same Society to organize Chinese churches. He had charge of the mission until about three years ago, when failing health compelled him to retire from active work.

At the recent Christian Convention, at Detroit, Mich., says the *New York Evangelist*, one brother, a noble representative of the coloured race, came as a delegate from the Pacific Coast. His genial humour and earnest Christian spirit won him many friends, despite the fact that the hotel at which he stopped refused him admittance to the general dining room, whereupon he quietly walked into the servants' hall and took his seat, followed by two well known Christian gentlemen (white) whose names and labours are honoured in all the churches, and who, during the remainder of the session, shared the table with him. This event, as remarked by one of the helpers in the house, produced by its Christian courtesy the most salutary religious impression which that hotel had ever known.

Says the *Christian Leader*: Rev. M. G. Campbell, M.A., of Falmouth, has published, through Messrs. Oliphant, Anderson and Fernier, of Edinburgh, an ingenious little "Catechism in Rhyme for the Use of Younger Children," on the basis of the shorter catechism. The new mode of question and answer in rhyme and rhythm cannot fail to be helpful in fixing in the memories of the very young those great truths which it is most important for them to know. The booklet comes heartily commended by Drs. Marcus Dods, Alex. Whyte, and Oswald Dykes; with such a trio of sponsors it can defy the critics. But we may venture to testify that Mr. Campbell makes the memorizing much easier by his simple melodious rhymes. They are often very happy and in no case grotesque—a notable feat in its way.

At a missionary breakfast at Birmingham recently, at which Rev. J. Jones, who was expelled from the island of Maré, in the South Seas, was present, Dr. Dale uttered a timely protest against what has the appearance of French vindictiveness against British Missions in heathen lands. "It is all the same," said Dr. Dale, "whether the Empire, the Monarchy, or the Republic obtain in France, her officials, goaded on by priests, repress Protestantism, wherever possible." And he added: "When M. Paul Bert, the bitter opponent of Clericalism at home, went as Governor of Tonquin, he remarked that their free thinking and liberty of conscience views were not for exportation. In Tahiti and several other South Sea Islands, in Madagascar, and wherever our missionaries have been signally successful, the French have, if opportunity offered, tried to damage them."

The yearly statistics of the Baptist churches of Great Britain, just published, for 1888, show an increase in the membership of the Baptist denomination. There are now 2,645 churches, with 3,591 chapels and preaching stations, in England and Wales. These provide accommodations for 1,180,467 worshippers. In England there are 1,380 ordained ministers, and in Wales 375. The communicants are said to be 209,558 in England, while the comparatively large number of 75,891 are returned from the principality of Wales. In Scotland there are 101, and in Ireland twenty churches. The aggregate returns for the whole of the United Kingdom give 2,770 churches, and 3,745 places of worship, with a membership of very nearly 300,000. In the Sunday-schools there are 452,167 scholars, with 45,977 teachers. The Rev. Dr. Booth, secretary of the Baptist Union, gives a statistical summary of Baptist churches throughout the world. These he sets down at 37,478, with a total membership of no less than 3,326,542, which shows a marked increase on the similar summary made four years ago. The total number of Baptist ministers and missionaries, in all parts of the world, is 23,150. Of these, 1,755 reside in England and Wales, of whom the large proportion of 1,367 are returned as members of the total abstinence society.

The annual meeting of the New York Society for the Suppression of Vice was held January 22nd. A large audience was present. The report of the Treasurer, Mr. Kilian Van Rensselaer, showed that \$9,322.78 had been expended during the year and \$8,470.79 received, making a deficiency in the expense account of \$1,041.45. The report of the Secretary, Mr. Anthony Comstock, showed that ninety-four arrests had been made by the Society during the year, that 101 convictions had been secured, with penalties amounting to fourteen years and seven months in prison, and \$6,585 in fines. Among the material seized and destroyed by the Society during the year were 8,490 pounds of indecent books and papers, 200,145 lottery circulars, 33,200 pool tickets, over half a million vile pictures, a large amount of gambling paraphernalia, the total weight of all the matter seized being over five tons. During the fifteen years of its existence, the Society has secured penalties amounting to 278 years imprisonment and 93,103.95 in fines, while bail bonds have been forfeited amounting to \$76,700 more, making a total secured for the Public Treasury of \$168,805.95, not one dollar of which has come into the treasury of the Society. The reports of Messrs. Van Rensselaer and Comstock were followed with interest and eloquent addresses by Rev. Dr. John Hall and the Hon. Chauncy M. Depew.


