ALGONQUIN PARK

Algonquin Park, comprising 1,000 square miles of highlands, lakes and rivers, is one, only, of nature's playgrounds along the line of the Canada Atlantic Railway.

This vast extent of practically virgin wilderness has been aptly been termed "Lakeland," and the Canada Atlantic Railway penetrates it for almost two hundred miles.

Owing to the rugged nature of the country, the route of the railway follows the water-courses, and the consequence is that the line skirts the borders of over seventy lakes, winds along the banks of many rivers to their source, presenting a charming outlook from the car windows, mile after mile, the only change being, from time to time, a dash through a belt of majestic pine and hardwood forest, sufficient to relieve that weariness which possibly follows a surfeit of any one phase of nature, no matter how grand or imposing.

Too much stress cannot be put upon the entire desirability of this territory as a playground for the recreation and entertainment of all those weary ones
