

By Way of Introduction



THE visitor to Hamilton is usually taken to the brow of Mount Hamilton and permitted a birds-eye view of the city. He sees the large factory buildings with their numerous stacks, each bearing witness to a tremendous industrial activity; he distinguishes many imposing buildings--churches, schools, civic institutions and business structures; the parks, the well paved streets are pointed out to him--also the beautiful scene of bay and beach in the distance.

But probably the greatest impression left with the visitor is of the sweeping panorama of roofs of homes--the homes of the people who make Hamilton the splendid city she is.
