Condorcet was born in 1743, and educated at the college of Navarre, where he soon distinguished himself by his mathematical powers. Between 1763 and 1773 he published, in somewhat rapid succession, various workson Geometry, and kindred ber of the Academy of Selences, became in 1773 its secretary.
