THE AVONDALE FARM SALE.

IN leading number at Avondale herd is, of course, May Bebo Sylvia, who is regarded by her owners as one of Canada's greatest cows. At 4 yrs. she made 13,641, at 5 yrs. 26,321, and in exactly the twelve months she is now again in test in anything but good condition and after an attack of milk fever, has already reached a little over 400 lbs. and the tenth day of test makes 17 lbs. of milk. As the sale records of this cow are so well known, it is not necessary to discuss her any longer.

In the sale is her grandson, sired by Francis M. Jones' great 44-lb. bull, a son of E. J. Pontiac Lake, the first 44-lb. bull and a daughter of King of the Pontiacs. The young bull, now just a year old, from May Bebo Pontiac, a year old, and May Bebo Sylvia and King Pontiac Art Canada, a typical Pontiac bull and the only bull in America both of whose grandams have over 40 lb. records.

Another great cow, Della Model Johanna 2nd, has just finished a second 7-lb. record in thirteen months. This great cow has three daughters in Avondale herd, one a Jr. 3-yr.-old, another a good candidate for a 40-lb. cow next freshening. In the sale are six or eight daughters of Woodcrest Art Canada, 35 being retained in the herd, and six or eight daughters of Woodcrest Art Canada, freshening in the sale of this bull's daughters.

One of the highest record cows in the sale is Alice Tennen with a record of 21,212 in 30 days and over 117 in 20. This great cow, without being dry, also again equalled her 30 days' record, giving, in that time, over 160 lbs. of milk. She is a 3-yr.-old; a show cow and first and second prize winner at Winnipeg and Brandon.

Another fine type of cow is Anna Ross, a 4-yr.-old, with a record of 22,719 in 30 days, and 105.75 in 20 days, a beautiful, straight cow. Another 3-yr.-old, Lady Bege Carmo, a show cow with a record of 32.28 lbs., will attract attention. Two full sisters, Queen Mercedes Dione and

Queen Mercedes Dione 2nd, are fresh at the time of writing and just starting test, and should be in the sale. An exceptional offer is in Kordyke Glad Dore, sired by a son of Pontiac Lady 2nd, and a daughter of Pontiac Kordyke.

Two of the best King Pontiac Art Canada in the sale that have come to milk have been officially tested, except one, the one with record 17 lbs. as a 2-yr.-old. Without describing many of these, we must mention the young cow, Senora, a show individual with 21.64, with a 2-lb. imported, a young cow that has a future before her. Two exceedingly fine individuals, full sisters, Pontiac Art Canada, with a record of 13.25, and Pontiac Countess Kordyke, not yet in milk, will attract attention, being daughters of a fine cow with a 23-lb. record. Graciosa A. Dekel, the oldest of these daughters, has no record, as it was impossible to test her last calving, but has been bred for some months; the second, just a 2-yr.-old, has just finished a 7-lb. record over 30 lbs. There are several others of these from 18 to over 30 lbs., and all of them good calves, so it will be seen that Avondale is putting in good stock.

Amongst the younger things are two or three which Mr. Hardy is putting in because they are good, and also because the herd from their individually alone. It is with regret that they go out before being tested, the other several months old, are fast. Two of these are the best Kordyke Kordyke, one of the first 21-lb. 2-yr.-olds. Another, a daughter of the same sire, is a 2-yr.-old, first, either junior or senior, with over 21 lbs., and another daughter of K.P. Canada has just finished a 23-lb. record at barely 2 years. The young things are certainly to be excelled as individuals, and will be a credit to any herd.

Among the daughters of Woodcrest Art Canada, the 33-lb. Piete bull, imported by the Avondale Farm, is a beautiful individual is Avondale Fet, which, with a young bull related to her, also on the same side, are good examples of this bull's offspring. Mr. Hardy is ready to guarantee that the yearling heifer will stand first or second in any Canadian show ring or give her money. The dam of this heifer has a 20-lb. 3-year-old record. The young bull, now in test, has an 18-lb. 2-year-old record, and is almost as good an individual. Among this younger stock is Avondale Dekel, a 3-year-old daughter of a 13-lb. 3-year-old, bought by Dr. Harwood at Avondale's last sale. This youngster, bred sired by Woodcrest Sir Clyde, another Princess Maria, a daughter of Princess Stella 35th, a 34-lb. daughter of Countess Begia (17.70), for some time King Bege's highest testing daughter. The dam of this heifer is now in test, and a 20-lb. record is long for a 2-year-old. This is one of the attractions of the sale.

Two fine individuals are daughters from untested dams by Piete Kordyke Lady, whose first 10-lb. daughter was tested out by M. Delatich, Kenmore, Ont.; this bull has had a dozen daughters from 20 to 25 lbs.; these are two especially fine heifers.

Amongst the young bulls, besides the grandson of May Bebo Sylvia, there is a very fine yearling son of Countess Stella, some mentioned: a beautiful yearling from Piete of Orchard Hill, one of Avondale's show-ring winners with over 37-lb. test, and had a dozen others all with tested dams of the highest standing.

King Pontiac Art Canada has 23 tested daughters, and her records are being made week. Of these 23, two have already been sold by G. A. Brecken, one making 21.10, the other 26.61, while another, a daughter of 20 to 21.17 with Mr. K. M. Delatich, Kenmore, giving this great bull 23-lb. daughters, three others over 25, and eight more over 18 to 20, a record for a number of bulls in Canada compared with the whole number of tested daughters, are far beyond anything else in Canada. It is a pleasure to consider. One now in test is making 24 lbs. We shall give further details in advertising as records are made, as many now listed will freshen in the next couple of weeks.

HIGHLAND VIEW OFFERINGS.

WE have been doing some testing at Highland View Farm this winter, and among other things, we have developed a couple of 100-lb. cows of the May Bebo and Keyes strains of breeding. We are offering for sale a bull, sold from one of these cows, May Bebo Keyes, and another from a good daughter of hers. These calves are good individuals. May Bebo Keyes is a show cow, and is out of the same dam as May Bebo Sylvia (as sold by us), and is from the same sire as Lady Bege Carmo. She made 23.18 lbs. butter in seven days and 27.5 lbs. milk in one day.
