read, praying an aid to build a bridge over the River Antigonishe, at the Indian Gardens.

A petition of Valentine Troop, and others, Inhabitants of Granville, was presented by Mr. Ritchie, and read, praying an aid for the road leading from the main road in faid Township to Parker's Gove, on the Bay of Fundy.

A petition of William Freeman, Joshua Newton, and Nathaniel Smith, late Commissioners for erecting a Light-House on Costin's Island, at the entrance of the harbour of Liverpool, was prefented by Mr. Parker, and read, praying for the repayment of the fum of 1071. 23. 112d. by them expended for the use of the faid Light-House; and also a compensation for their services as Commillioners.

A petition of Joseph Fennel, was presented by Mr. Shaw, and read, praying for a drawback of the duties on 485 gallons of Rum, exported from Antigonishe to Prince Edward Island, in September, 1813, amounting to 431. 155.

A petition of Hugh Denoon, and others, Inhabitants of the town of Pictou, was prefented by Mr. Mortimer, and read, praying that the provisions of the feveral Acts relating to the appointment of Firewards, may be extended to the Town of Pictou.

A petition of John Burton, and others, Inhabitants of the town of Pictou, was prefented by Mr. Mortimer, and read, fetting forth : That the petitioners are members of the feveral Prefbyterian Congregations refiding in the Diffrict of Pictou, and have provided themselves with places of Worship, and Ministers for the celebration of Divine Ordinances according to their religious principles; and praying the aid of the Houle to enable them to make fuch regulations by Law as may be neceffary for carrying into effect the original defigns of the faid Congregations.

A petition of Alexander Henry, and others, Inhabitants of the middle and upper Settlements of Mulquodoboit, was presented by Mr. Lawson, and read, praying for an aid to improve their roads.

Ordered, That the faid petitions do lie on the table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House on the confideration of the feveral Bills which flood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair.

Mr. Pool took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had made fome progrefs in the bufinefs to them referred, and that the Committee had directed him to move for leave to fit again on the confideration of the fame, which report the Houfe agreed to.
