BIRTH RATE IN ONTARIO.
Births, marriages and deaths occupy a
report of 43 pages just issued by the registrar-general's dept. and dealing
with the statistics for 1905. The birth ate for the year was 23.5 as compared of 9.2 was 0.3 in excess of the previous Ecar. Essex county continued to con-
ribute an undue proportion of these, howing 93 over York County. This is
the result of a large. number of Amesican couples coming ovef to be
married. The death rate was 14.2, the number being only 81 in excess of 1904 . he proportion of illegitimate births was very low and decreasing from 1.50 in
1889 to 1.34 in 1905 . The next lowest

land with 3.04, Soctland 6.33 , Italy 6.34 ,
