Week-end Reports Are Encouraging; Foe Advance Once More Halted

By Courier Leased Wire London, April 29 .-- (Via Renter's Ottawa Agency).—Week-end reports from the front are distinctly heartening, showing that the Germans have been prevented from exploiting the Kemmel success, thanks to the stout Anglo-French resistance. On the whole, indeed, the Germans have been pushed back somewhat, losing even heavier than they did in the storming of Mount Kemmel. The French at Locre and the British at Voormezeele two local points of Voormezeele, two local points of fighting, fought, with the most furious tenacity. Though neither place can be called vital to any line place can be called vital to any line of defence, yet the resistance has hampered progress of the enveloping movement which the enemy now seems to be directing against the next chain of heights. Little doubt is entertained that the enemy having failed to roll up the British army from Givenchy to Arras, has decided to strike northward for the coast with all his weight.

Rumors of Revolution by Which Grand Duke Alexis Was Placed on Throne, are Prevalent; New Government Will Not Recognize Germano-Bolshevik Peace Treaty

Despatches from Petrograd and Moscow, dated Tuesday last, give no indications of the reported revolt in Petrograd on behalf of the former Grand Duke Alexis Nikola ievitch. Swedish newspapers continue to report that Alexis has been proclaimed Emperor and that the new Government will not be bound by the German-Bolsheviki peace treaty. It is declared disorders were reported in Russia

Meanwhile the Germans and White Guards are rapidly approaching the Russian border north of Petrograd and the dissolution of the Red Guad revolt is said not to be far off. The two largest Red Guard forces have been cut off from each other and the capture of Viborg, 75 miles northwest of Petrograd, by the Germans is expected short ly. Communication between Viborg and Petrograd has been severed.

An Associated Press despatch from Stockholm Saturday reporting rumors that former Grand Duke Alexis has been declared Emperor of Russia in a counter-revolution, added that the new Government would refuse to recognize the new treaty with Germany. Esthonia borders on the couthern coast of the Gulf of Finland and extends from the Gulf of Riga to near Petrograd. It has been reported that Emperor William was to become Duke of Esthonia and that Esthonia was to be closely allied to Germany.
