### FULLERTON HOLDSWORTH

A quiet wedding took place in the Digby Baptist church at 1.15 Wednesday afternoon when Mr. A. W. Fullerton, at one time editor of the Courier and later a member of the editorial staff of The Ladies' Magazine published at Toronto, was united in marriage to Miss Jennie Holdsworth, of Digby. The ceremony was performed by Rev. F. H. Beals, Minister.

The War Office states that the 5th Battalion Royal Garrison Artillery will leave England for Halifax about 20th Sept. On arrival general officer commanding at Halifax will be able to relieve Special Service Battalion of Royal Canadian Regiment from further duty. Secretary of state for war desires to convey his appreciation of the valuable assistance rendered by the Canadian government in maintaining a battalion at Halifax. He has much pleasure in testifying to the good behavior of the battalion.

It is expected the 3rd Special Service Battalion will be disbanded October 1st.

Sir Frederick Borden, in an interview, states that at the colonial conference Canada's representatives declined to enter into any bond to contribute to imperial defence. The matter of the training of Canadian seamen will be taken up at Canada's own expense, although, if necessary, this country will co-operate with Britain.

## GRAND PRE.

The third son, twelve years old, of James Anderson, Avonport, and an older brother, were out back of the arm with a gun, Thursday evening of last week. The gun in the hands of the older boy, was prematurely discharged and the charge of shot was received by the little fellow, at close quarters in the right arm, literally tearing the hand and wrist to pieces. The terrified boy carried his wounded brother to the house and rushed for a doctor. As soon as possible Dr. Chipman and Margeson arrived and amputated the arm below the elbow, the operation was done by lamp light. As much as possible of the arm was saved. The boy is doing well and was a brave little fellow through it all.

Trooper Chaplain, Rev. A. J. Brace 2nd, C. M. R., gave his experiences in South Africa to a good audience in the Methodist church last Friday evening. Trooper Brace was in the Hart's River fight. He and five others stood off 60 Boers until they were shot, their ammunition gone and they were surrounded. Corporal Kinsley, a V. C. man, and Trooper Day, Nos. 1 and 2, were shot through the head, and Brace, who was No. 3, with the bullets pelting around him, shot the Boer who had just killed his comrades. The four were captured, stripped, threatened with death, but ultimately let go, and tramped 35 miles to camp, without clothes or shoes, and afterwards in hospital for weeks. The "Block House" system and the great "drives" were most graphically described. The lecture throughout was intensely interesting and the speaker was given an enthusiastic vote of thanks at the close. Several curiosities gathered on the battle-fields and elsewhere were shown, and among them the pants and hat given him by the Boer who stripped him of his clothes.
