THINGS TO DO NOW.

Now is a good time to look to the windows. If they rattle on windy nights, make them tight.

Keep the shades up in the south rooms these bright cold days. Sunshine is worth more money than carpets.

If a room has west windows and north windows, fasten up the north windows tight. Ventilate the room with the west windows till spring. If the attic is unceiled or not plastered, look for cracks in the shingles. A pound of putty and an old caseknife will do wonders in keeping out drifting snow and icy rain.

### **WOMEN ARE** UP IN ARMS

Try to Break in at the Re-Opening of Britsh House of Commons

'WE WILL HAVE VOTES"

London, Oct. 24.—The reassembling of Parilament yesterday drew large crowds to Westminster, despite the fact that the opening of the sessions was devoid of sumptuous ceremony or the appearance of royalty.

The formal opening of the House of Commons occurred during the afternoon, and before the House of Lords, thus giving the throngs of spectators an opportunity to witness the assembl-

an opportunity to witness the assembling of both bodies. The public galleries were overflowing with visitors. Mr. Balfeur, the ex-Premier, unexpectedly appeared, and received a hearty greeting from the Opposition ranks.

Women Cause Scene.
Unusual excitement was caused by
the presence of about 100 women suffragists, many of whom, despite the protests of the police, managed to find their way into the outer lobby of the House of Commons, with the intention of buttonloiling the members in sup-port of their movement.

A number of the suffragettes, as they are termed here mounted vacent

are termed here, mounted vacant chairs in the lobby and began to harangue the few members of Parliament present in that part of the House. The police, after being reinforced, made a strategic advance against the hypotens taking the women doely and invaders, taking the women singly, and gradually ejected them one by one,

from the house.

Attempt to Break Into House.

During the height of the tunult a small band of the staunchest suffragists determined to attempt to break into the House itself, and charged towards the entrance of the inner lobby. For several minutes, the utmost disorder, almost a riot, prevailed, and the police had all they could do to eject the women, who resolutely refuse to leave without these of the contractions.


