Dominion parliament opened on Thursday.

Rev. J. Donovan occupied the Baptist pulpit last Sunday morning.

The inventor of the bicycle railway, for which the dominion government is asked to grant a charter to a company organized to construct it, claim that a speed of 120 miles an hour can be developed, so that passengers travelling by it may leave Winnipeg after breakfast any fine morning and reach Toronto in time for a late dinner.

In all the churches of Wolfville last Sunday reference was made to the approaching election and particularly to the prohibition plebiscite. In the Baptist church at 5 o'clock a mass meeting was held. The building was filled with an attentive audience. The pastor, Rev. Dr. Higgins, presided. The speakers were Rev. A. Cohoon, Rev. Oskar Gronlund, Rev. D. J. Fraser, Rev. A. Martell, Prof. A. E. Caldwell, Dr. DeWitt, Prof. Wortman and Prof. Kierstead. At the close the audience by a rising vote declared unanimously in favor of prohibition.

The mass temperance meeting in the Baptist church on Thursday evening of last week was a very successful affair. The chair was occupied by Prof. Tuttle who opened the meeting with a brief but splendid address bearing on the subject of prohibition. Rev. J. W. Fisher, of Canning, was the speaker of the evening, and his somewhat lengthy address was listened to with rapt attention by the large audience present. Mr. Fisher is an eloquent speaker, and fully conversant with the prohibition question. It was followed by Rev. A. Cohoon in a short and pithy address. Appropriate music was furnished during the evening by the choir.

The Plebiscite.

Reports from all over the Province indicate a large vote in favor of prohibition. In the city of Halifax the majority was 1455. The following places in this county have been heard from up to going to press:

Funeral of the late T. R. Harris.

The funeral of the late T. R. Harris, of Aylesford, who died so suddenly on Tuesday, 6th, took place from his residence on Friday and was very largely attended. He was buried with Masonic honors. A large number of the fraternality, including members of Harmony, Ionic and Kentville lodges were in attendance and proceeded the hearse in regalia. Eureka chapter, Royal Arch Masons, of Annapolis, of which deceased was a member, attended in a body in full regalia. The funeral cortege marched in procession to the grave, where the services of the church of England were conducted, after which the solemn and impressive rites of the Masonic order were performed, the brethren forming a circle around the grave. On the casket were placed a number of floral tributes including one from Eureka chapter.

Among the Horsemen.

Mr. D. B. Shaw, of the Willow Vale Tannery, is the owner of one of the best looking carriage horses in this county. Her color is a beautiful blood bay; height, 15 hands; sound as a dollar, and as kind as a pet lamb. "Topsy" can do a mile in three minutes, with a week's handling. The latest invention in horse shoes is the rubber shoe. A deep groove is cut at each side along the base, into which rings of India rubber are inserted, after the horse has been shod. This insures a proper foothold and materially lessens the concussion. The shoes are also much lighter, wear longer, and the nails, being under the pads, are prevented from working out.
