

An Appreciation of Rev. M. P. Freeman

Victory Loan Prize Essay

A. C. A. STUDENT WINS PRIZE.

The committee appointed to judge the essays submitted by colleges and collegiate schools in Nova Scotia on the subject of the Victory Loan, 1919, have reported that they have read some fifty essays submitted and that they have awarded the prizes to Mur-

ray Baker, of the Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy, Wolfville, and Wilfred M. Marshall, of Halifax, a student at Dalhousie University. They found both essays of equal merit and recommended that each be awarded a Victory bond. The judges were Mr. Justice Chisholm, Rev. H. W. Cunningham, rector of St. George's, and Major J. W. Logan, of the Halifax Academy.
