

KEEP GREAT LAKES AT PRESENT LEVEL

Opinion That Diversion of Lake Michigan Will Be Defeated.

Washington, April 29.—The proposed diversion of water from Lake Michigan for the Chicago sanitary district, which would lower the water level of the Great Lakes and cause serious damage to several Canadian lake ports is now practically defeated, according to opponents of the measure who were in Washington for a further hearing before the Rivers and Harbors Committee of the House today. They expressed confidence that the bill authorizing the water diversion cannot be passed in this Congress.

The bill, which is opposed by representatives of the Canadian and United States lake ports, would authorize the Chicago sanitary district to divert 10,000 cubic feet per second from Lake Michigan.

William S. Rigby, retired chief of the United States army engineers, advised rejection of the proposal because, he said, it is essential that the level of Lake Michigan be unaltered. The international treaty with Canada, he added, specifically differentiates between diversions and usages of water and was shown up to limit the former.

Harry Thaw's Ex-Wife Asking For Another Trial of Famous Case



Five Days Granted Evelyn Nesbit's Counsel to Give Specific Reasons For Re-trial—Action Taken on Behalf of Her 13-Years Old Son, Russell William Thaw.

Philadelphia, April 30.—Motion for a new trial for Harry K. Thaw, declared same last week by a jury, was filed today by William Gray, counsel for Evelyn Nesbit, Thaw's divorced wife, in behalf of her thirteen-year-old son, Russell William Thaw.

In addition to the request for another trial counsel obtained an order granting him five days in which to file specific reasons for a retrial.

The petition for a second trial sets forth the usual contentions that the verdict of the jury was against the evidence and the weight of the evidence and against the charge of the court.

Thaw is still at the Pennsylvania Hospital for Mental and Nervous Diseases pending hearings on the petition.

Will Not Sleep For Next 144 Hours
The Bar Association to Investigate Doings of County Lawyers.

Houlton, Me., April 29.—At the beginning of the April term of S. J. Court, the Aroostook County Bar Association appointed the following committee to make investigation and report on the doings of Aroostook County lawyers: Judge Nicholas Fossenden, Port Fairfield; Hon. John R. Roberts, Caribou; Hon. Charles F. Daggett, of Presque Isle; Hon. Peter C. Keegan, Van Buren, is president of the Aroostook County Bar Association.

Immediately on the opening of court the following prisoners were arraigned: Donald Jolin, Ashland, for stealing 16 black foxes valued at \$5,000; two black foxes, \$4,000; pleaded guilty.

John Craig, Presque Isle, on false pretense in order to defraud, pleaded not guilty.

Paul Caron, Caribou, for false pretense in order to defraud, pleaded not guilty.

William Sullivan, Houlton, charged with being a common seller, pleaded not guilty.

It has been announced that Carl Cassidy, who was arrested for assault upon Deputy Sheriff James Hens of Monticello, when he tried to arrest him for illegal possession and illegal transportation, has been located in Cambridge, Mass. He is under arrest and is expected to arrive here any time and will stand trial.

The following indicted respondents were arraigned this afternoon: Ernest Smith, Port Fairfield, keeping in intoxicating liquor, pleaded not guilty. Smith is serving time in the county jail, being sentenced last November.

Walter Boyle, Portage Lake, charged with having in his possession 49 quarts of mash. He pleaded guilty and was remanded for sentence. Boyle is serving time, having been committed at November term of court.

Arthur T. Good for assault upon Margery Good, pleaded not guilty. The case will be ready for trial Tuesday morning.

Richard Verrier, common seller. H. M. Briggs appeared for the defense. Quite a bit of excitement came after plea of not guilty had been entered when County Attorney Powers announced that the case was peculiar insofar as the respondent had been promised immunity by the U. S. Federal Court for testifying last December.

The Court ruled that if the prisoner pleaded not guilty, the case would stand trial. It is expected that this plea may be retraced and no other plea may be entered.

County Attorney Powers informed the Court that he had no case ready for trial at the present time, and no further business to bring before the court then.

The Court complimented County Attorney Powers for the fine work he had done and said he could take his time and report at his discretion; that the Court and jurors could wait. The case of State vs. Mamie Riley Drake, on charge of maintaining a nuisance, was taken up, a plea of not guilty entered, and bonds of \$1,000 given. It is said George E. Thompson of Bangor, is to defend this case.

MOST TERRIFYING SCENES AT RECTORY
Ghastly Manifestations That Alarm Irish Rector and Family.

Paris, April 30.—There is a man in Paris who will not sleep for the next six nights and days. He will eat and drink, but never close his eyes. The man who hopes to accomplish this feat is Beauge, the referee of the six days' cycle race.

The Velodrome d'Hiver is where the race is held, and the participants are known as "squirrels" because they go round and round like squirrels in a cage. The "nuts" they receive take the form of special prizes offered for sprinting.

A man will go out into the middle of the enormous track-circled ring and through a megaphone announce that Miles X. will give a thousand francs for a sprint.

At the word "Go!" the little figures on wheels, who have been revolving in a listless way round and round the asphalt, automatically come to life and tear round and round, faster and faster, yet, so that one of their number may win the thousand francs.

There are fifteen teams in the race this year, men of all nations; each team consists of two men, one of whom rests while the other rides. The Velodrome d'Hiver during the six days is where Belleville and Passy meet on equal terms—or shall we say White-chapel and Mayfair?

Belleville Whitechapel, in caps, and with stubs of cigarettes stuck to its lower lip, break out into song during the long watches of the night. "Hardi Coco" is the song they sing year after year to brace up the weary men going round and round and round.

"Passy Mayfair comes on after the theatre or between visits to a dance hall, for it is chic to be seen at the Velodrome d'Hiver during the six days, or rather during the six nights. It is just as chic as a first night at a fashionable theatre, a big race day over the sticks at Ascott, or the last day of a sensational murder trial. And it is the same public, sensation seeking.

The women are the principal donors of special prizes. Before they appear they watch the flickering arc lamps making the racing automatons appear like figures on a film; they revolve past one, and then fade away into the distance and almost out of sight.

There is a pull of wind, the rattle of metal, the echo of a curse, when one man nearly fells another, and they are gone again. Round and round and round, all day and all night while you are reading this, and long after you have forgotten it. Round and round and round, with haggard faces, come from their machines for a brief rest, while their partner holds the track, they fling themselves on couches in their cubicles. The women rush to see them while they rest, until they return to the track and go round and round and round.

After a cow belonging to Mr. Parry of Westminster, Vt., had been unable to eat for several days because of an obstruction in her throat, a potato was discovered lodged there and was removed. The cow and nearly starved, but recovered rapidly.

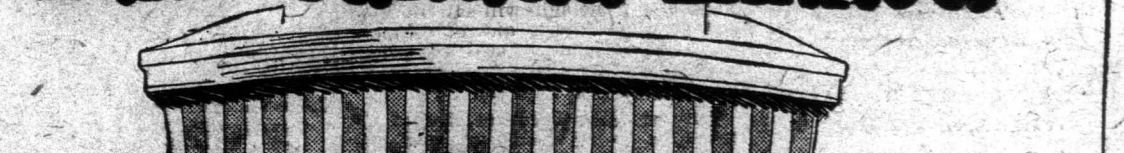
