The cause of the run off cannot be definately learned, but it is thought to be due either to a spread or a broken rail. The train was running smoothly along when the passengers, most of whom were asleep, were awakened by a sudden jar. Thus with a bumping and jarring the big train crashed badly-oroken up. and rails and sleepers smashed and broken.

Immediately on receipt of the news here the auxiliary car and crew were sent to the scene of the wreck. Wrecking crew was also sent from Campbellton and soon tifty men were at work and traffic was resumed that afternoon.
