## The Tired Business Man

The Tired Business Man like many another celebrated character, may be largely mythical; but the attitude of mind which is supposed to be his is unfortunately rather common, even among persons who cannot claim the distinction of being either "business" men or "tired." The individual thus afflicted enters a theatre, and opera house or a concert hall without any preparation whatever and without any intention of exerting his mental faculties. He sinks languidly into his seat and, in effect says: "Well, here I am, now entertain me if you can. And frequently his words are not so much an invitation as a challenge. This frame of mind may not be a great drawback at some time performances, but needless to say, it is hardly conducive to a proper appreciation of serious music. Any great work of art—a drama, a poem, a painting, a symphony—makes certain demands upon him who would enjoy it. Its purpose is not to relieve the boredom of an idle moment. It must be approached with out prejudice and with a determination to avoid the injustice of a hasty condemnation.

## Rubinstein Said It

The possibilities of the piano are by no means exhausted and until this is achieved the pianists of today and tomorrow have a great goal before them in striving to equal the art of say Rubinstein and other famous masters of the piano. It is true that the standard of piano playing has advanced wonderfully. This was the case even in the time of Rubinstein. And this fact recalls to mind a remark of a master not untinged with satire. When Rubinstein played in Moscow "everybody was there," and the concert was sold out weeks in advance. Shortly afterward Rubinstein went to hear a new pianist—who had already made quite a name for himself by reason of his talent—at a recital which was rather thinly attended. When he was asked after the recital what he thought of the newcomer's playing Rubinstein wrinkled up his heavy brow and then said earnestly "Oh nowadays everybody plays the piano well." That was the point. "Everybody plays the piano well." But how few—how very, very few—ever approach the artistic stature of the master, Rubinstein!

## Immigration Rush Expected For Canada

Ottawa, July 22—A highly optimistic report regarding the possibilities of heavy immigration to Canada from the United Kingdom, is brought back by W. E. Scott and Russell Wilson, who, for the past six months, have been engaged overseas in the selection of immigrants under the plan of the Soldiers' Settlement Board. Messrs. Scott and Russell declare that Canada is looked upon overseas as a land of promise and that the demand for berths to the Dominion far exceed the transportation facilities available.

In fact they declare Canada is in for the biggest immigration rush which she has had for many years past.

Desirable Class  
As a direct result of their efforts, on behalf of the Settlement Board, 600 carefully selected settlers will be added to the farming communities of the Dominion. All have seen active service and all are considered suited for agricultural purposes. Each man is required to have a capital of at least \$1,000 and transportation is paid by the Imperial authorities. The majority are of the officer class. Many of them have capital far in excess of the minimum required and sufficient to establish them on substantial farms or ranches.

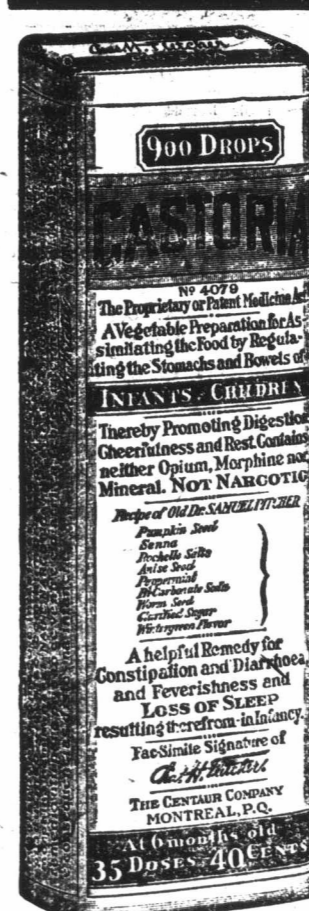
## Boy Leaves Home At Barnaby River For St. John
