

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A YEAR crossed on the ice from Kelly's Cove to the Innis Hospital on Monday.

A WATCHMAN has been appointed by the City Council for the Daltry Block, the scene of the recent fire.

COL. HENNEY, the new commandant of the Canadian Militia, arrived at Ottawa on Thursday.

The surplus of revenue over expenditure for the first five months of the present fiscal year was \$475,000.

TRAVELLERS crossed the ice at Haggarty's Wharf on foot Friday, and it is not infrequently to admit of horses crossing it.

The Dominion Parliament has been further prorogued till January 15th. The date of opening has not yet been fixed.

The painting of the interior of the Dominion Building has been completed, and reflects much credit on the contractor.

The Charlebot was towed in from the Three Tides, to Pule's (No. 1) Wharf, on Monday forenoon, in order to discharge cargo and repair the leak.

BALFOUR has ordered a man-of-war to convey ten tons of mail to the distressed inhabitants of Charlebot, Inverness, owing to the failure of the potato crop.

A CHANGE of drunkenness has been preferred against Police Sergeant John Harris, rather than that the accused is sent to his resignation, and, it is said, left the island.

A SUIT for \$20,000 damages has been instituted against the City of Halifax by the heirs of James Bedford, who was killed by falling through a hole in the sidewalk.

McCORMICK, a life prisoner in Kingston Penitentiary, who escaped from the penitentiary hospital about a month ago, has been arrested at Denver, Col. Extradition proceedings will be begun.

The main building of the Canadian Bridge and Iron Company's Works, Montreal, was badly gutted by fire on Friday night, and a large amount of valuable machinery destroyed.

BEVAN has been sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or six months in goal for having the worm in his possession. The worm was ordered to be handed over to the Collector of Inland Revenue.

The Stanley arrived from Pictou on Sunday, yet we will receive no foreign mail until to-night, and possibly not even then. The mail boats received were brought over on Saturday by the steamer St. Lawrence and Princess of Wales.

The monument in memory of Major Short and Sgt. Wallace, who lost their lives in the first St. Saviour, May 16th, 1880, is to be made by Herbert, the Canadian sculptor, and will be unveiled at Quebec on the second anniversary of the Rev.

FRANCIS WHELAN, Patrick Kennedy, John Miller and John Green, all well known officers, who staffed the bullet boxes at Jersey City, N. J., in November, 1880, were sentenced on Friday to eighteen months in the state prison.

Mr. SARGENT, who has been in England investigating the prospects for a market for Canadian eggs and poultry, arrived at Ottawa on Thursday, and reports an unlimited market in England, provided the produce sent is of a good quality, and properly shipped.

The steamer William arrived here on Saturday evening with a load of coal on Capt. R. McMillan. The steamer is now owned by the Capt. and his brother, Hugh McMillan of New Haven. She is to be loaded up and ready to start on her regular runs, the owners knowing that as good work will be done by her local as foreign works.

On Sunday last Rev. Peter Curran, of St. Dunstan's College, preached at High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. This was the Rev. gentleman's first appearance in the pulpit of St. Dunstan's, his last being from the Gospel of the day, the second Sunday of Advent, and his discourse was a logical and well considered exposition of the mission and preaching of St. John the Baptist, the precursor of our Lord.

While a party of lumbermen were cutting the logs a mile north of Kingston, Ont., recently, one of the party, a Frenchman, named L'Amoureux, became frightened at the sudden approach of the mill, and jumped overboard and swam ashore. He was rescued, and landed on the shore of the lake, it being impossible to take him to the congested ground.

Wm. G. WATSON, Esq., Controller and Auditor of this city, dropped dead at the residence of Miss Brown, on Sunday evening. Mr. Watson had only just arrived home from his wife, and was returning himself at the dining-room when death's messenger came. His wife, who was engaged in another room of the house, heard the fall, and hastened to the room, only to find her husband lying on the floor dead, he having fallen from the chair on which he sat.

Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—After the withdrawal of McCarthy and other anti-Parnell members, the supporters of Parnell adopted resolutions expressing regret at Gladstone's refusal to sit his views on the question submitted to him and ratified the rejection of Parnell as Chairman.

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—The feeling amongst Montreal Irishmen is running higher daily for Parnell. At a large meeting held to-day, presided over by C. J. Doherty, Q. C., the following resolution was moved by H. J. Cloran and passed unanimously: Resolved, that this meeting agrees with Cardinal Manning that Parnell should only be deposed upon political grounds, and further avers that no grounds exist for demanding the retirement of the leader of the Irish people. Strong speeches were made in reply to the statement that Irish bishops were against Parnell. It was stated that the bishops were against Daniel O'Connell and if they were wrong then they might be in error now. A cable announcing the result was sent to Parnell, and the meeting broke up with cheers for the Irish leader and Ireland.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Sir Charles Tupper cabled yesterday that two other vessels had been prohibited from carrying live cattle to Great Britain; also that the cargo of the steamship Core is suspected of pleuro-pneumonia.

General Herbert will be banqueted by the Toronto militia officers on the 18th.

Mr. Saunders has submitted his report on his mission to England in which he gives detailed information as to the manner of preparing and shipping eggs and poultry for the English market. As an example of the willingness of English firms to try Canadian produce, he states that Nelson Bros., of Liverpool, who have 500 retail stalls in various parts of England offer to take all the Canadian goods that may be shipped, and handle them at five per cent. They will give the advantage of extensive refrigerator works, capable of unlimited accommodation, free Mr. Saunders considers Liverpool preferable to other cities as a point of distribution. The average wholesale prices of fowls on the Liverpool market when he was there, were 12s and turkeys 16 cents per pound. Several commission merchants offered to handle Canadian produce at three per cent.

HALIFAX, Dec. 7.—Five ocean steamers arrived to-day: The St. Pierre from St. Pierre (reports a fearful storm at the island), the Polynesian, from Liverpool via St. John's, N. F., the Manitoba from Glasgow, the Captain from Baltimore, and the Miranda (long overdue) from St. John's, N. F.

J. P. Chetwynd has been committed for trial in the Supreme Court for further charges preferred against him. Magistrate McDonald has committed for trial in the Supreme Court the two informers who have been giving evidence in liquor cases for the Law and Order League. It is said several cases are out on the market and cheery rumormongers are circulating.

HALIFAX, Dec. 8.—A despatch from Fort Hawkeley says: The gales for the past week are unprecedented in the history of that harbor—more casualties occurring in these few days than during the last 30 years.

At five this morning the Gerlie C. H. collided with the Annie Gates, with produce from E. L. Jones. The Gerlie C. H. Empress, which had been floated, was drifting at the head of the harbor, collided with the Annie Gates.

The schooner Nettie drifted from her moorings and ran aground on the rocks. There were several minor disasters, much of the trouble caused by the vessels not being carefully moored.

The Alpha arrived from Bermuda to-day and reports bad weather all the way up. A gale, which passed over Jamaica and Bermuda, did great damage to crops, and the worst in ten years.

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—An emergency meeting of valuers and shippers was held to-day, to consider the grave state of trade with England. Sir Charles Tupper having called to the department at Ottawa, that certain cargoes were deferred from further carrying, and that a strong opposition was coming from English agriculturists. It was decided to send P. H. Jones, a Government Inspector, to England, to strengthen the High Commissioner's hands in the light he is bringing for this great Canadian industry. A delegation was also named to confer with the members at Ottawa.

Sir Charles Tupper called to-day that the cargo in the Ocean has been released, as the ship had no signs of pleuro pneumonia.

A Glasgow engineer and Vancouver capitalist are now promoting a scheme for a graving dock at Vancouver.

A prominent shipper from this district, in an interview to-night, states that eggs, poultry, and lamb, in which he deals, do not bring him as much in the American market as they did before the McKinley Act came into force.

New York, Dec. 4.—Mrs. Corolla V. E. Miller, charged with receiving \$132,000, alleged to have been embezzled by J. M. Field & Co., of London, whose extradition was sought by the British Consul, was discharged to-day by United States Commissioner Shiple.

NIAGARA FALLS, Dec. 8.—A party of engineers from Montreal are striking a line for a new bridge across the gorge at a point between this village and the suspension bridge. It is thought they are working in the interests of the Canadian Pacific.

NORFOLK, Conn., Dec. 8.—La Grippe is again in this town, as a result of the cold wave, and has already made its way into many houses.

GEORGETOWN NOTES.

A large amount of shipping has been done at Georgetown this season, and a number of vessels are still loading there. Some of these vessels have come from the neighboring rivers, which they have left on account of the frost, and have come to Georgetown to complete their cargo, where there is no danger of being frozen in.

As will be seen elsewhere the schooner or Morica made Georgetown harbor on Friday morning, having sustained considerable damage during the severe gale.

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FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

Monday last, feast of the Immaculate Conception, was duly celebrated in this city. In the cathedral solemn pontifical mass was celebrated by his Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Revs. Dr. Morrison and D. E. Reid, as deacon and sub-deacon, and Rev. P. A. Macleod as master of ceremonies.

The sermon of the day, an eloquent tribute to our Lady of the Immaculate Conception, was preached by Rev. Father Macleod. In the evening, at seven o'clock, were sung, Rev. Dr. Morrison officiating. Solemn benediction of the blessed sacrament, followed by Rev. Father Curran and the choir, as deacon and sub-deacon.

At Nine o'clock the feast was celebrated with unusual solemnity. The large hall was converted into a magnificent chapel, and an altar constructed with flowers and lights, was erected on the stage. At half past seven o'clock in the morning mass was celebrated by Father Macleod, at which over one hundred members of the children of Mary society took communion.

In the evening, at seven o'clock, an immense congregation assembled to assist at the devotion. His Lordship Bishop Macleod presided as excellent sermon on devotion to our Lady of the Immaculate Conception. A large number were a recipient of the sacrament into the children of Mary society by Father Macleod. This was followed by solemn pontifical benediction of the blessed sacrament, followed by Rev. Father Macleod and J. Macleod, as deacon and sub-deacon. The music at last mass and benediction was of a very high order.
