Citizens' Committee Meet.

The Citizens' Committee held their
regular meeting last night, Chairman
Soper presiding, and over twenty
members being present.

A discussion took place causing
much diversity of opinion, over the
fact that no information had been
received in answer to a communication
sent the Municipal Council, June 2nd,
asking for a statement of houses and
names of streets not connected with
water and sewerage.

Only one reply had been received
from the absent members who were
written to two weeks ago. While the
Committee has no power to disman-
ish any member, surely the absent ones
are gifted with enough public spirit to
attend the meetings and work in the
interest of their city or send their
resignation to the Secretary.

Mr. Alex Mews reported on the salt
nuisance and quoted the opinion of
veterinary surgeons and municipal
governments in Canada and the United
States where salt is prohibited
from being used on the streets.

Mr. Peel stated that salt on Water
Street owing to its damaging effect
on rubber footwear increased the sale
of those articles one hundred per cent.
Some small bills for stationery and
advertising were ordered to be sent to
the Colonial Secretary for payment.

Section 92, Sub-Section C, of the
Municipal Bill calling for the appoint-
ment of arbitrators brought forth con-
siderable discussion. Mr. Kelly and
others favoured the Mayor being one
of the arbitrators. The following
amendment was proposed by Mr. H. E.
Cowan and seconded by Mr. James
J. Spratt and carried by vote, viz:—

"That the Council appoint one ar-
bitrator not a member of the Council;
the owner of the land in question a
second, and in case of their disagree-
ing on the third party, a Judge of
the Supreme Court to act. In case the
land owner refuse to appoint an ar-
bitrator, he will be chosen by the Su-
preme Court."

The meeting closed at 10.20 o'clock.
