On November 18, 1477, William Cax-

ton printed at Westminster a book called "The Dictes and Sayings of the Philosophers," dictes being a word of Latin origin, and meaning the same as sayings, an Anglo-Saxon one. It had been translated from the French by Anthony Woodville, second Earl Rivers. This was, as far as any evidence goes, the first book printed in England. Born in Kent, Caxton was in 1438 apprenticed to a London mercer, or merchant, of silks and woollen cloths, but, after his master's death he went to Bruges, in Belgium and set up in business for himself, becoming practically governor of the English merchants in that country, and in Holland; but he learned printing, perhaps at Cologne, in Prussia, and printed translations on the Continent. In 1476 he returned to England in the reign of Edward the Fourth, and by 1476 the first printing-press in this country was erected in the Almonry. or place for giving alms or merciful gifts to the poor, outside the west end of Westminster Abbey, in which he was encouraged by Thomas Miling, the abbot, or father, of what was then as abbey or monastic church.
