

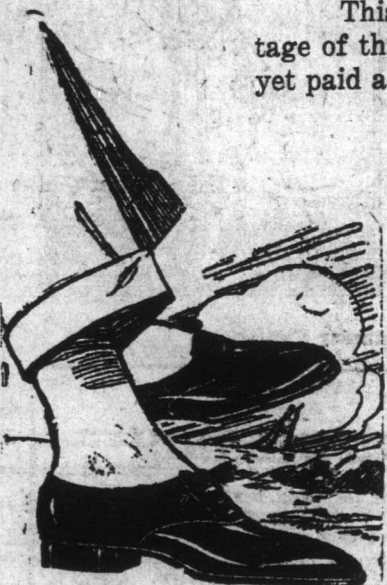

### Did Goddess Make Man?

Dr. Stephen Herbert Langdon professor of Assyriology at Oxford University, has published a book containing translations of Sumerian liturgies that were, it is believed, in use 5,000 years before the birth of Christ.

Sumer was the name given to the land in the south of Babylonia. Prior to B.C. 2,500, before ancient Greece was still a land of savages, the Sumerians had built up in Mesopotamia one of the most enlightened civilizations of all history. So far as is yet discovered the origin of the race is unknown or how many thousands of years were spent in attaining the height of culture and prosperity indicated by the tablets found at Nippur and elsewhere.

The story of Paradise was written, in cuneiform script into clay tablets and then preserved for posterity by baking.

**Man Was Made of Woman.**  
The Sumerian story is that man was created from clay by a woman deity. Later, when the wrath of the great Enki, the water god, was aroused, she protected Ziusgudu, identified by Dr. Langdon as the equivalent of the Biblical Noah, by providing him with a boat. He landed in Paradise and there ate of the forbidden fruit, said to have been that of the cassia tree. For this he was condemned to labor.

Undoubtedly the group of texts which have the most human interest and greatest literary value is the epic group, designated in Sumerian as the *kurba* sagal. The sagal compositions are mythological and theological treatises concerning the deeds and characters of the great gods.

One of the most interesting examples is a hymn to the deified King Dungi of Ur. By a happy coincidence both the Philadelphia and the Constantinople collections possess copies of this remarkable poem and the entire text has been reconstructed. The poem mentions the flood, which, according to Epic of Paradise, terminated by divine punishment the Utopian age. A hymn to Dungi represents this god-man as having been sent to restore the golden age.

**Pillage of Abraham's Home.**  
In the various temple libraries throughout Sumer and Babylonia were liturgies to each of the great men. A tendency to include in all services a song to the wrathful word of the gods and a song to the sorrowful earth mother is seen even in the Nippurian breviaries of the pre-cuneiform type. It is needless to dilate upon the great influence which these principles undoubtedly exercised upon the beliefs and formal worship of Assyria and Babylonia, upon the late Jewish Church and upon Christianity.

A tablet the translation of which will be of interest to all students of the Bible is that containing an ancient lamentation on the pillage and destruction of Ur, the same Ur of the Chaldees named in the Old Testament as the ancestral home of the patriarch Abraham. This is one of the best preserved of all the tablets translated by Dr. Langdon.

One tablet just made public by Dr. Langdon contains a lamentation on the pillage of Lagash by the Elamites, another mysterious race not yet definitely identified by archaeologists. Lagash was one of the most famous cities of Sumer. A village site to-day upon the mound of sand that covers its ruins.

Dr. Langdon expresses no opinion as to the authenticity of the events described on the tablets. He only deals with those excavated treasures archaeologically, although it is clear that these ancient liturgies contained aspirations and expressions of hazy beliefs and principles that culminated in meridian clearness in the life and teaching of Christ.

### Bits About the Boat Race.

Why are you "Oxford" or "Cambridge"?

Sliding seats were first used in the race in 1873.

J. Toogood, who rowed in Oxford's first winning crew, weighed 14 stone 10 lb.

The Boat Race is the only big sporting event which cannot raise funds by a "gate."

The first inter-university race took place at Henley on June 10th, 1829, and Oxford won easily.

A racing eight now costs £130 and a set of oars £25. The pre-war prices were £65 and £12 respectively.

Westminster to Putney was the course for the second race, in 1836; the present Putney to Mortlake course was adopted in 1845.

The expenses this year have been so heavy that the Cambridge Club have had to double their subscriptions and also to appeal to past members for financial assistance.

The light and dark blues came into use in 1842; previous to that Oxford rowed in striped jerseys, canvas trousers and black straw hats; the Cambridge men "pleased themselves."

### The Climbing of An Office Boy.

From office boy to head of one of the world's largest steamship companies is the rise made by Mr. J. C. Gould, who is also a member of the British House of Commons for Cardiff, Wales.

He began work as an office boy in a shipping house in Cardiff. He found the life irksome, and as soon as he was old enough he shipped as a seaman on a vessel bound for South Africa. Arriving there, he

took a position in the office of an insurance company, and for a few years he followed clerical work there and later in the United States. Returning to Cardiff, he started on his own account a marine insurance business; but when the war came on he changed his business from marine insurance to shipping, and he did a great deal to maintain the merchant service during the critical years of Germany's unrestricted submarine piracy. Mr. Gould is a frequent writer in the British press on shipping and industrial topics, and his views command wide attention.

### The Wonderful Figure 9.

There are some figures in our calendar that have a way of cropping up periodically, and faithfully reminding us. Have you noticed that the figure 9 is one of these numerals that we cannot get rid of?

This figure appeared on January 1, 1889, and will be with us 111 years from that date, or until December 31, 1999. No other figure has ever had such a long consecutive run. The 9 itself has only once before been in a race which lasted over a century—that in which it figured continuously

Miss Joan Vivian Rees, who broke 31, 999, also a period of 111 years. The figures 3 and 7 occasionally fall into very odd combinations, but neither of them has ever served for a longer period than ten consecutive years in our calendar since the present mode of calculating came into existence. Mathematicians have proved that from their relative positions among the numerals, it is an impossibility for either the 3 or 7 to appear in date reckoning continuously for a longer period than a century.
