

If there was a Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Athletes, I think the whole Committee would be indicted for neglecting to provide soft ground for the broad jump by digging a pit or even by doing any other more intricate thing. If the Committee have any thoughts of pity hereafter, I feel certain, they will provide a decent one for the broad jump on the next A.A.A. day.

### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

#### PERU QUILTS LEAGUE.

LIMA, Peru, Sept. 8. Peru does not intend to participate any further in the League of Nations and will reconsider its decision only if the United States decides to join the League, according to a statement made by Foreign Minister Salomán, Friday, concerning Peru's failure to send a delegate to the present assembly of the League.

#### OPPOSES EX-KAISEER'S MARRIAGE.

DOORN, Sept. 8. Members of the family of former Emperor William strongly oppose his marriage to Princess Hermione of Reuss and are hopeful of preventing the union.

#### SMYRNA UNDER FIRE.

ATHENS, Sept. 8. Smyrna is being bombarded by Turks, according to nine aeroplanes crews arriving here this morning, the airmen telling of their departure from the city under fire, a tenth machine having been hit by an enemy shell.

#### STILL HOPE FOR INTERNED MINERS.

JACKSON, Calif., Sept. 8. Company Government and State officials have begged a judicial statement declaring their firm belief that all of the 47 miners entombed in the Arzonau shaft are still alive. The conclusion is based on a chemical test of air emanating from a chamber in which miners are imprisoned, no gases from dead bodies having been discovered. Five thousand dollars reward has been offered to the first crew that breaks through to their relief.

#### IRISH PARLIAMENT MEETS.

DUBLIN, Sept. 8. The Provisional Parliament for Southern Ireland met this morning in the Parliamentary Chamber, Leinster House.

#### NEW COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

ATHENS, Sept. 8. General Hadjiassitis, commander-in-chief, succeeding General Trikoupi, now a prisoner with the Turks, arrived at Athens incognito. He is quoted as saying "defeat of our army is inevitable and fatal. I will speak when the moment arrives and show I am not responsible. My advice and suggestions were not acted upon."

#### GREEK ARMY DEMOBILIZING.

PARIS, Sept. 5. Demobilization of the Greek army is to take place immediately, only two younger classes to be retained under arms, according to an Athens despatch to the Havas Agency. Police in Athens have ordered the closing of all music and dance halls.

#### EVACUATION OF SMYRNA.

ATHENS, Sept. 8. Smyrna is being evacuated amid scenes of great disorder, according to refugees, 2,300 of which have arrived here. Panic reigns as the Turks approach the town, it is reported and Greek soldiers are contending with civilians for places on outgoing ships. Premier Kalamitopoulos is expected to present the names of his new cabinet to King Constantine this evening.

#### Prisoner Was Unlucky.

Amongst a host of good stories in G. E. Burgin's new book, "More Memories and some Travels," is one that was told to him by Mr. Newton Grass, the American barrister. It concerned a friend of his, also a barrister, who was defending a negro charged with burglary. Attached to his brief was a plan of the burgled premises. This the barrister handed to the jury for their inspection.

The jury promptly found the prisoner guilty, greatly to his counsel's surprise, for he thought he had made out a good case for an acquittal. He understood the reason, however, when the plan which he had handed up to the jury was returned to him. For his own guidance, he had marked on the plan "Here's where the nigger got in!" And he'd forgotten to rub it out!
