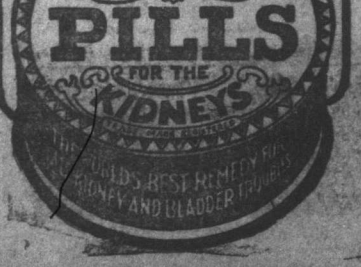

Largest Hole in the World

The most interesting diamond mine in the world is not at Kimberley, but near Pretoria—the Premier mine, "the largest hole in the world."

The great open Kimberley mine can still be seen, but the actual working there, as elsewhere in that district, has now to take place underground, as the diamond-bearing "blue" clay nearer the surface has been exhausted.

The Premier is still an open mine. It is an enormous gaping hole in the middle of the veld, half a mile long and a quarter of a mile broad, with its floor 400 feet lower than the surrounding country. St. Paul's Cathedral, London, could be dropped into it and one or two hundred yards from the edge would know where it had gone.

Standing on the brink of its precipitous sides and looking at the hundreds of workers far below, I felt as if I were watching a scene from Dante's "Inferno"—this particular hell, I imagine, being reserved by extremist Labor leaders for shareholders, writes the Hon. E. G. Knollys.

Down below, as looking into a busy mine, the black figures were shovelling the blasted "blue ground" and pushing about small trucks, containing the earth ready for crushing, on the network of rails which lead to the tunnel up which the trucks are dragged to the surface workings. A swinging cage takes one down to the floor of the mine. There one has a more realistic view of the work than the impressive but somewhat unreal one from the top. I experienced first-hand a thrill at finding myself walking on the slaty-blue earth which actually contains the diamonds. But then I realized that in every hundred of these truck-loads, each weighing a ton, only about twenty carats of diamonds would be found.

When I was there not much work was being done, on account of the slump in the diamond trade. In prosperous times there are shifts working throughout the twenty-four hours, some of the most powerful searchlights being placed at night round the top edge of the mine.

The most impressive moment is at blasting time, which takes place every afternoon to loosen the ground for carting away on the following day. A red danger flag is hoisted in a prominent place. All the workers come out of the mine except those required for lighting the fuses, already placed in position. At a given signal black figures rush along the bottom side of the precipice, setting light to the fuses. Having done this, they scurry to shelter in the "bomb proofs" in the centre of the mine. The interval while the time-fuses burn seems an age (in reality it is only one and a half minutes. One feels that the slower lighters will not gain shelter in time. Then one explosion, another, and then a continuous roar. Rock and earth fly into the air, sometimes almost up to the surface, reminding one of a rather ragged artillery barrage.

The famous Cullinan diamond, named after the chairman of the company, was found in the Premier mine, and, in spite of its great size, over 3,000 carats, it was only part of a still larger stone. The other piece, broken off, has never been found.

The mine has had a remarkable history. When diamonds were first found on this isolated farm in 1902, the property was hawked round for sale at \$475,000. Now the cash assets exceed three-quarters of a million; more than \$115,000,000 worth of diamonds have been extracted from the mine, and its life still appears unlimited. The capital remains at \$400,000, for all development has been paid for out of profits. Stores on hand are taken into the balance at 50 cents, and diamonds on hand at 25 cents. A remarkable record!

Sixty Ocean Liners Coming Here

BIG BUSINESS IN SIGHT FOR THIS PORT DURING THE COMING SEASON.
(Halifax Morning Chronicle.)

For the first time for many years the Cunard Company are advertising in Great Britain for Canadian freight for Halifax, the home of the founder of the line. This very significant announcement, in many respects, one of the most important advertisements relative to the port of Halifax which has appeared for many years, is the direct outcome of the removal of the one per cent. per-one hundred pounds differential, which for years militated against the development of the port business of this city, and the increase of the Canadian British preference of ten per cent. on goods of British origin imported into Canada through Canadian ports.

T. E. Barastad, of the Robert Rowland Company, agents for the Cunard Line in Halifax, said to The Morning Chronicle reporter Saturday: "With the differential removed and the increase in the British preference effective, I think you will find a great deal more cargo passing through Halifax this year than ever before."

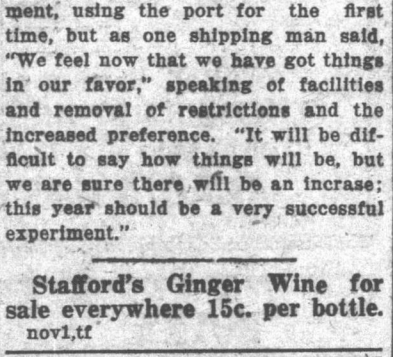
Big Business in Sight.

Already the port is feeling the impetus of having the restrictions which have penalized it for years removed, and facilities for handling cargoes provided, as evidenced in the large cargoes of tea which have recently arrived from Ceylon. As a result of all this, prominent men in the shipping business of the city say that prospects for the approaching year's business are away above par. Even in the short time it has been in force the results have fully justified Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, in his belief that such an amendment to the British Preference, of which he himself was the author, would prove productive of much good to Canadian ports. The recent progress in the development of Halifax indicates that the Government is realising the importance of a great national port, and desirous of meeting the requirements of shipping interests, which have been constantly placed before the Government by the Board of Trade of Halifax.

Sixty Big Liners Coming

The outlook for passenger traffic through Halifax this coming winter is exceedingly good. There will be in the vicinity of fifty transatlantic liners calling east and west bound, or an average of three ships a week. The International Mercantile Marine, the Anchor and Anchor-Donaldson Lines, and the Cunard Line and the Royal Mail Steam Packet will be the principal lines having ships call here. Some of the ships calling will come here in the nature of an experiment, using the port for the first time, but as one shipping man said, "We feel now that we have got things in our favor," speaking of facilities and removal of restrictions and the increased preference. "It will be difficult to say how things will be, but we are sure there will be an increase; this year should be a very successful experiment."

Paris Drug Store Wrecked by Motor Cars Forty Times

Paris. (A.P.)—There is a corner drugstore close to the terminus of the Northern Railroad which possesses an irresistible attraction for motor-driven vehicles. Placed just below the meeting point of two rapidly descending streets, it has been wrecked forty times in the last thirteen years. Three months ago a motorcyclist drove through its glass front and died on the spot. A few days later a motor lorry crashed through into the middle of the shop, without causing any fatalities. Recently a taxicab went right through the store, breaking the large red-clored globe that still marks a drug store in France, overturning the counter, and doing about \$1,500 worth of damage to the stock.

The proprietor of the store complains that these repeated mishaps are ruining his business, his shop is forever under repairs, and customers go elsewhere.

Sentenced But Free

Owes His Liberty to a Legal Mistake.

Although he had been found guilty and sentenced to four months' hard labour, William Desmond, a boat-maker, this week walked out of the Oxford Quarter Sessions a free man. He owes his liberty to a legal mistake and to the refusal of a jury to return a verdict as ordered by the Recorder.

Charged with assault and with being found in possession of house-breaking implements, Desmond had been sentenced to four months' hard labour at the Petty Sessions. Half an hour later the magistrates' clerk found that the Petty Sessions had no jurisdiction to try that class of offence.

Four days later Desmond was again brought before the same magistrates and sent for trial. He protested he had already been tried once. The Recorder this week told the jury that as the Petty Sessions had no power to try the case they must return a verdict that Desmond had not been sentenced for that offence. The jury, however, found he had been sentenced, and as it was impossible to try him twice on the same charge Desmond was set free.
