The neighbors are all native-born, ex-ept a few of the old Selkrik settlers from Sutherlandshire. They are gene-rally confortable in their circumstances, and take things easy. The young soon make acquaintances, and ours are visit-ing or being visited almost overy even-ing, like others fond of amusement. They emjoy all the privileges here you have in Guolph., The church is near, and a ser-mon twice on Sabbath, besides Sabbath behool and prayer meetings, libraries, dec. Janet teaches in a stone school house within half a mile; she could have got a higher salary 12 miles distant, but here she boards at houre.
